I recently read a short but provocative book about ministry. One of the images that the author described was the image of the earth orbiting the sun. He then went on to argue that ministers with responsibility for running parishes need to realise they are like the earth and not the sun. Sometimes it is tempting for all of us, particularly those with responsibility, to think that everything revolves around us and to try and organise church life round ourselves. This is not helpful. If anyone is to be the sun it is the Lord Jesus Christ and our personal lives and our church lives should be ordered around him.

I find this image helpful as we move into a new phase of working together in our new Group ministry. Certainly when I came to Hartlepool six years ago I did not anticipate the arrangement as it has emerged between our three parishes. But we are where we are and God calls us to press on together in worship, collaboration and mission. As we do this it's important for all of us to take a step back from time to time and ask ourselves about our priorities and what God is calling us to do.

Over the next six months and probably longer we will be entering a period of transition and change. Elsewhere I have written an article about the need to review our service times. We are really grateful to Rev'd Andrew Craig for all he has done at St Luke's over the last 18 months, but he plans to retire in August and this means some of the changes will come quite quickly. In the midst of this process let's make time to listen to one another and remember that we are all brothers and sisters together in Christ. What's more let's resolve to live our lives with the light of God in the centre.



I write this from a third storey armed forces welfare flat in the seaside town of Lossiemouth on the Moray Firth, where we are visiting our daughter, her RAF husband and our two grandsons. Our elder four year old grandson is having sleepovers every night so we are awake early each morning! From the lofty viewpoint we can watch the amazing sun rises over the sea, then turn in the other direction to see the snow on the distant Cairngorms which still seem to tower over the nearby forest!



We, like our daughter and husband, have quickly grown to love this diverse area and the eclectic mix of people. The mainly rural landscape merges seamlessly with military airfields and bases, the sea, the forests, farms and mountains yet the towns and houses don't overshadow each other. Those who live here hail from all over the United Kingdom and abroad. People seem to live together harmoniously, drawing on their miscellaneous skills and talents, cultural backgrounds and traditions, to the mutual benefit of all. It is amazing how many people move here reluctantly – but then don't want to leave....

Our daughter and family have also been won over by this tranquil place with so much to offer families. They are now buying a home nearby and even when our son in law has another posting, this will be the family's home base. They know it is many hours drive from family and friends and major hospitals are an hour and a half's drive away. But they are prepared to put up with the inconveniences and difficulties and adapt to the environment in order to benefit from the peace and beauty of the area, the friendliness of those who live here and the way everyone supports and encourages each other; to leave the rat race behind and enjoy family life in all its fullness. We too are pleased that our grandchildren will be able to benefit from water activities, winter sports, all aspects of nature, plus a more laid back approach to education - even though the distance makes visits a real expedition!

The recent joining of the Three Parishes is a coming together of diverse folk with varied traditions and approaches. But we all come with a love for the same God and the teachings of Jesus, albeit bringing different talents and skills to the melting pot. We bring the best of love, compassion and mutual respect, we know how to support each other and the stranger in our midst, giving security and hope to those in need. Together we will become stronger and how we work through our difficulties and differences will send clear messages to those around us. So let's be positive and determined, but open and tolerant, so that we become a point people are drawn to (maybe reluctantly), yet find they want to stay, despite the obvious negatives - because of the quality of joy and love they discover dwelling here.

Money Matters:

Thank you, Faith Gap and The Parish Giving Scheme:

I would like to start this article to saying **thank you** to each and every person who has continued to contribute financially to our parish. The great news is that as we look back over the last year God has provided for all our needs and your contributions have enabled us to pay all the bills both large and small. In addition to this we have received two grants and a gift that mean we can build the extension at St Matthew's Community Centre. **Thank you.**

At the end of last year the PCC faced some difficult decisions about our budget. We want to continue to invest in God's work in the parish and beyond. But the reality was that we needed to reduce our budget. A number of folk have experienced changed circumstances either retiring or moving to new places in the country and our income reduced significantly as a result. We therefore reduced a number of items of expenditure in the budget, the main one of which is our parish share, which this year is £30,000. We have also committed to our employees Clive and Trish, paying all our regular bills and to continue supporting mission through CMS link missionaries and the work with asylum seekers. We did however set a budget with '**a faith gap**' of £5000. In other words if everything stays the same we will end up £5000 worse off by the end of the year. Do please prayerfully consider how we together can find a way forward in this.

During March we will be hearing more about this and possible ways forward. As part of the solution we are encouraging everyone who gives to the Church regularly to consider moving to the '**Parish Giving Scheme**' (PGS). I personally have found this really easy to use. PGS collects money via direct debit, claims gift aid efficiently and pays all the money direct to the church within a few days. All the money comes straight to the PCC.




Dukeshouse Wood

Mary Baines' recipes

Moving Cake

1 ½ cups All Bran
1 ½ cups sultanas or raisins
1 cup sugar
1 cup of milk
1 ½ cups SR flour



Stir All Bran, fruit, sugar & milk together
Leave to stand overnight
Next day, add 1 ½ cups of SR flour & mix well
Put in a greased & lined loaf tin
Bake in medium oven for 1 hour
Turn out onto a wire tray to cool
Slice & serve buttered

Noodle Au Flauf (from Switzerland)

9oz plain or spinach tagliatelle
Salt
3-4 eggs
40 fl oz (2 pints) milk
6 oz cooked ham cut into strips
Pinch salt & pepper
3-4 oz grated Cheddar cheese



Heat oven to Gas 5 or 190C
Cook pasta in boiling salted water till tender – 6-8 minutes
Drain & put with ham strips in a greased oven proof dish (2 ½ pint size, 2" deep)
Mix eggs & milk, season and pour over tagliatelle – if pasta not quite covered add extra milk
Sprinkle with grated cheese
Bake for 25-30 minutes until golden brown
Serve with crisp green salad

The question is are we living our lives as a villain or a hero? Makes you stop and think...






