Advent – Preparing to Celebrate (The musings of a priest)

Advent is a strange time of year. It's a time when the world around us is already celebrating (and has been for many weeks) the festive season. But for the church, this is just the prelude to the party. We know it's coming, and we are gearing up for it – a little bit like the bridesmaids watching and waiting for the bridegroom to arrive in our Gospel reading from just a few weeks ago on Remembrance Sunday. All around us, the decorations are going up in celebration of Christmas – a festival that sadly fewer and fewer people around us truly understand the meaning of.

For us, Advent is a time of preparation, a time of waiting, and a time of expectation. We gather together and revisit the stories of the nativity that we know so well, the prophecies that foretell of the coming of Christ, and the people that paved the way, playing such a huge part in the story (Mary and Joseph, John the Baptist, Elizabeth, Zechariah, and of course the Angel Gabriel). During Advent, we prepare to celebrate the birth of our Saviour.

During Advent, we decorate the church quite simply – we have our Christmas Tree (a relatively modern addition to the Christmas traditions), we have our Advent Wreath, with the four candles (not fork handles!), and then we decorate our churches with greenery rather than with flowers in full bloom. Why do we do this? Because we wait in expectation of the celebration. The party hasn't started yet.

There are many different traditions around Advent and Christmas and we see this in the Advent Wreath. The candles representing the Patriarchs, the Prophets, John the Baptist, and the Virgin Mary, with the central fifth candle, the one we light on Christmas Day, representing Christ himself. At least that's how I know them. There are other meanings attributed to the candles – perhaps you know them as representing Hope, Peace, Joy and Love. We might see different colours being used. There might be four red candles with one white (or gold) one, or maybe we'll see three purple candles with one pink one and then a white or gold candle in the centre of the wreath. Incidentally, the pink one is used on the third Sunday of Advent (Gaudette Sunday) rather than the fourth Sunday which many people assume because of the fourth Sunday links with the Virgin Mary

But Christmas is when the party truly begins. Christmas is when we can finally celebrate the birth of Christ, the fulfilling of a promise, of prophecies foretold. Christmas is traditionally when the flowers, blooming in all their glory, come back into the church – when the time of preparation, waiting and expectation is over, and we can finally celebrate the birth of Christ, our Saviour, born on Christmas Day.

Grace, peace, and a very happy Christmas to you all.

From the Home Front



I recently made a trip to Surrey to visit friends. On the Saturday morning we set off around the M25 to visit Eltham Palace. It was a cold but bright autumn day. Eltham Palace was where Henry VIII and his siblings

grew up and he spent parts of his reign. The house and medieval hall fell into ruin over the years but in 1933 the wealthy American couple Stephen and Virginia Courtauld, leased the house and rebuilt it. They spared no expense to restore the Medieval Hall to its former splendour and remodelled the Palace into an art deco ultra-modern party house. I found the buildings amazing, but very thought provoking.

To walk across the entrance bridge where Henry VIII had walked made me feel a very small speck in history. This king was all powerful and ruthless as a ruler. Nonetheless his selfish actions led to the founding of the Church of England, which is the root of my Christian faith and beliefs. God brings good out of bad. Touring the house the opulence and luxury of the rooms was breathtaking. So much inherited wealth! My Christian socialist ideals were battling with my appreciation of beauty and history. However what was once the preserve of the rich was now accessible to everyone!



As we walked past the Medieval Hall we looked across the ancient walls and restored gardens to the most incredibly clear view of the City of London skyline! We easily spotted The Shard, The Gherkin, The Walkie-Talkie and Docklands financial area. Once again conspicuous wealth, often gained by greed and desire for riches, possessions and power, with no thought of others.

Thomas More, Lord High Chancellor for Henry VIII, visited Henry VII and Henry VIII at Eltham Palace. He was a man recognised for his intelligence, impartiality and wisdom. As a teenager I watched the film 'A Man for All Seasons', about More's life and death. It had a real impact on me. I loved the costumes and buildings and the political and religious intrigue, but I clearly recall the integrity and faith which Thomas More showed throughout the film and which led to his death. A quotation from the film which embedded itself in my mind still resonates "...it profit a man nothing to give his soul for the whole world..." . As a knowledge hungry youngster I discovered this was from the Bible – Mark 8 v36 'For what shall it profit a man, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul?". It made me consider not only this life but eternal life and salvation. Wealth is worthless if it only benefits the few, possessions cannot go with us after death, power is transient and fraught with danger and challenges from others desiring the same. But love is free to give and receive; compassion costs nothing but is valued highly, hope is enduring and lifesaving – a lifebelt, sustenance for the desperate, often just a word or a small action is enough to ignite a flame of hope!

Remember nothing in this world is worth gaining if you lose your soul to acquire it.....

Autumn Gardening News

This is going to be an attempt to fill some of the gap left by the loss of Ann's monthly article about her garden and assorted wildlife, especially the birds. This particular effort will, however, be seasonal rather than monthly and will be limited by my vastly inferior knowledge in the wildlife department. I will do what I can!



So, to Autumn, "season of mists and mellow fruitfulness", when the main event is, of course, the Autumnal hues of the trees and bushes, with their multi-coloured leaves and the ethereal quality of the ensuing bare branches. In my own garden, the silver birch tree that we planted some 25 years ago, is as beautiful when it drops its leaves as it is in Summer. When the leaves have gone, the stark, white trunk and branches become the star of the show.

I was lucky enough in October to spend a few days in Perthshire, where against a backdrop of mountains, lochs, rivers and waterfalls, the trees were putting on their finest performance. One of the sights I love to see is the reflections of trees mirrored in rivers and lakes and I was not disappointed. This happened twice during our visit, once at a famous beauty spot near Pitlochry called 'Queen's View' (named after Queen Isabella who married Robert the Bruce in the 14th century), where there are panoramic views over Loch Tummel and again whilst walking along the River Garry near Killiecrankie.

Of course, the wonderful thing about Autumn in terms of plants and trees is that we know that, when they die back, most of them will return, looking like new, a few months later. It may not be a good idea to question God's creation in a church magazine (please don't cancel me!), but I sometimes wish He had designed us to send out new shoots and look lovelier than ever when spring arrives too.

Moving swiftly on, I have noticed that there have been species of birds in my garden recently that I have not seen for some time – our occasional visiting robin has returned and a pair of resident blackbirds that have become so familiar that I have named them (Janet and John) have been much in evidence. We have also played host to a pair of thrushes, which I know are much rarer nowadays and we have not had the pleasure of their company for several years. Thankfully the sparrow hawk which was hovering over our garden in the Summer seems to have gone elsewhere. I had a rare opportunity one day to study it for several minutes while it sat completely still on our bird bath, no doubt waiting for its dinner to appear, and I felt very conflicted at the magnificence of this beautiful creature that inflicts such suffering on its more vulnerable victims. But that sounds depressingly familiar in relation to our own species, so who am I to talk? To finish (yes, we're nearly there), our God deserves so many thanks for the beauty of the natural world and it is a great pleasure and a privilege to have my own little plot where I can plant and look after and enjoy what He has provided. Thank you, God, for the grass, the trees, the plants and flowers and for all the creatures that share our gardens with us. Amen.

Living in Love and Faith

Our Lord Jesus Christ said:

The first commandment is this:

'Hear, O Israel, the Lord our God is the only Lord.

You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart,

with all your soul, with all your mind,

and with all your strength.'

The second is this: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.'

There is no other commandment greater than these.

On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets.

This is a summary of the ten commandments, words we often use in our Communion services. Words that tell us the most important things we can do are love God with all that we are and love our neighbours as ourselves. When Jesus told the story of the Good Samaritan, he was teaching his disciples (including us) that our neighbour isn't just the person who shares the same views as us, lives in the same street as us, goes to the same church as us, or anything else for that matter. He was teaching that we are all loved by God, no matter who we are, where we're from, or what we have and haven't done with our lives. He was teaching that we should treat everyone in the way we ourselves want to be treated. He teaches us to welcome everyone with open arms, no questions, no judgements.

Over the last few years, the Church of England has been in a period of consultation across the breadth and depth of its member churches — with discussions involving both clergy and lay members alike. This process has been known as Living in Love and Faith, which set out "to inspire people to think more deeply about what it means to be human and to live in love and faith with one another. It tackles the tough questions and the divisions among Christians about what it means to be holy in a society in which understandings and practices of gender, sexuality, and marriage continue to change."

Last week (as I write this on 20th November), General Synod voted to allow the blessing of same sex marriages on a trial basis. This vote has been received with joy by some members of the church, and with anger and frustration by others. Some are glad to see progress being made, others think that this has not gone far enough, and others still think this 'progress' is a departure from the teachings of the church.

The views across the Church of England differ widely, and I'm sure we will all hold different views to some of the other members of our own churches and across our group, deanery and diocese.

In the new year, I would like to provide the opportunity for us to look at this, perhaps by running the Living in Love and Faith Course, across the Group, so that we can explore this in a safe space. You can find many more resources at www.churchofengland.org/LLF but in the meantime, whatever your thoughts and views on this, I just simply want to encourage us all to hold each other in grace and peace, seeking to love each other as ourselves.

St Columba's Church, on Thursday 30th November and 7th, 14th, 21st December, starting 7:00 pm.


You do not have to come to the first session to be able to follow the course. PLUS: If you would like to see the film without any breaks to help you remember it before you come to the course.



God's presence

Exodus chapter 33, verse 14 reads 'My presence will go with you and I will give you rest.'

Moses needed to know from God, who was going to go with him to lead the people. He knew he couldn't do it alone. Moses then went on to say "I will only go If you come with me". he knew that there was absolutely no point to go ahead in this great mission of leading the children of Israel out of Egypt, if God wasn't with him. Moses could not have done all that he did without the presence of God.

This week I was reminded of the wedding in Cana. Jesus was attending the wedding and all was well until the wine ran out. Jesus didn't get flustered. He didn't panic. He just asked the servants to go fill jars of water. He chose to use the people in front of Him, but it was His presence that changed the water into wine. Mary, Jesus mother, knew that Jesus' presence at that wedding was enough.

Jesus wants and desires for us to come to Him, to be intimate with Him. He wants us to invite Him to walk with us through our daily lives.

When we belong to Jesus, we have the Holy Spirit within us so wherever we go, we change the atmosphere. We change those around us, because the presence of God is in us and with us.

The same God, who led the children of Israel out of Egypt. The same God who parted the Red Sea. The same God who provided manna and quail in the wilderness is the same God, today!

He wants you to know that He is more than enough for you right now. He wants you to know today that His presence will go with you wherever you go. Today, ask Him to show you His presence. Be aware of His closeness.

Take time to experience Jesus closeness today. Read this passage of the wedding in Cana in John Ch 2 slowly and picture yourself at the wedding, picture yourself standing next to Jesus. What does His physical presence feel like? Notice how it feels to be so close to Him? What do you notice about the atmosphere around you?

'On the third day a wedding took place at Cana in Galilee. Jesus' mother was there, and Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine was gone, Jesus' mother said to him, "They have no more wine." "Woman, why do you involve me?" Jesus replied. "My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." Nearby stood six stone water jars, the kind used by the Jews for ceremonial washing, each holding from twenty to thirty gallons. Jesus said to the servants, "Fill the jars with water"; so they filled them to the brim. Then he told them, "Now draw some out and take it to the master of the banquet." They did so, and the master of the banquet tasted the water that had been turned into wine. He did not realize where it had come from, though the servants who had drawn the water knew. Then he called the bridegroom aside and said, "Everyone brings out the choice wine first and then the cheaper wine after the guests have had too much to drink; but you have saved the best till now."

You can ask Jesus to show you His presence as you walk through your day today. Invite him into every situation or circumstance. I hope you will see things differently and will look at your situation differently.

This 'repatriation 'goes against the appeals of multiple international rights bodies, and is likely to lead to the refugees facing torture and imprisonment in appalling conditions. Timothy Cho* – an escapee from North Korea and an Open Doors spokesperson – believes that China has 'cynically 'used the world's focus on Israel and Gaza as an opportunity to make the move without attracting attention. Hundreds more North Koreans are in danger.

"I have personally experienced repatriation once, and I am familiar with the process of imprisonment, torture and punishment that follows," Timothy Cho writes in a letter to MPs, in his role as Co-Secretariat of the UK All-Party Parliamentary Group on North Korea, exhorting them to raise the matter in Parliament. "I urge you to encourage the British Government to initiate a dialogue with Chinese authorities to facilitate the deportation of the remaining North Korean refugees to third countries, rather than sending them back to North Korea.

"Even if we can rescue just one person through these diplomatic efforts in collaboration with the South Korean government, it would be a significant achievement." "Many of these refugees are Christians, women, and children, including recently born babies," writes Timothy Cho. "The punishment for anyone that has been associated with Christian churches or missionaries while they were in China are likely to be dealt with particularly severely, indeed many are likely to be executed."

Open Doors ranks North Korea as the place where Christians face the worst persecution for their faith. If discovered by the authorities, believers are either sent to labour camps as political prisoners where the conditions are atrocious, or killed on the spot – and their families will share their fate as well. Christians have absolutely no freedom. Even having spoken with missionaries is a grave danger to those being sent back to North Korea.

Timothy Cho escaped from North Korea in his teens, after being repatriated once – facing imprisonment and brutal interrogation on his return. After a second escape, where he was again arrested in China, he was granted deportation to the Philippines after missionaries advocated for his safe release.

"I was so lucky. If I had been returned to North Korea again, I would not be alive today. That's a fate I want to spare my brothers and sisters, currently in prison in China."

This is not the first time that China has repatriated North Koreans who have fled across their northern border, however numbers have been far lower in previous years.

"It's too late for those six hundreds who've already been repatriated," adds Timothy Cho. "What we can do is to urge the Chinese authorities to deport any more escapees to a third country, such as the Philippines. This will ultimately allow them to reach South Korea safely."

Timothy hopes that a Backbench Business Debate can be heard in the Commons. Please pray that this happens and is effective – and pray for all North Korean refugees who've been repatriated, and those under threat of it.

Please pray for:

North Koreans to be kept from harm, and for Christians who've been repatriated to know God's loving comfort and sovereign protection.

That the UK Parliament will act wisely and compassionately in response to these actions.

Join with North Korea's Christians in praying for religious freedom to come to the nation, and light to overcome the darkness.



October Kilimatinde update from Jill Barrett

Stranton church has been supporting the Kilimatinde Trust since 1993 when Bishop Alpha Mohamed from the Rift Valley visited, and Reverend Stephen Taylor who was Vicar of Stranton Church welcomed him, took a team to visit the village and founded the Kilimatinde Trust in 1999. It's with thanks to Stranton Church for the sustained commitment that I'm sending this report

I spent three weeks re-engaging with Kilimatinde village and its organisations, particularly its hospital services, and community health facilities.

My overall impression was of a happy thriving village where people want to live. The community seems to be made up of people who have worked in the schools, government primary and secondary, plus St Johns's school, and Kilimatinde Hospital. There are students from St John's Seminary either studying or working. Some people have businesses, some work in shambas, or farms and of those who have retired who remain in the village

St John's is an English-speaking primary and secondary boarding school. The school fees are high and for those who struggle with books, uniforms or fees, school sponsorship helps, especially for children around Kilimatinde

Rev Cannon Ngassa received the Teddy Bear pattern from the Bear Ladies and is encouraging the sewing department in the school to make Kilimatinde Bears to raise funds to help support education in St John's.

My main reason for visiting Kilimatinde this time was to re-engage with the hospital. Kilimatinde Hospital is under the Diocese of the Rift Valley, which is responsible for the Hospital buildings and infrastructure, maintenance and ancillary staff, along with some medical and nursing staff, who are not covered by government provision. The government supply and pay for medical and nursing staff for those services which should be free. Running the hospital is very expensive ,and the Kilimatinde Trust and other supporters assist. As a Trust we are in regular contact; Stephen Taylor, who founded the Trust, has regular contact with the Diocese and the Bishop. I am a nurse attached to the Trust and have been visiting for 10 years now with a particular focus on the hospital and its health systems, including the Burns Unit which offers the first 10 days of treatment free. This life saving initiative, was opened in 2018. The Trust allocates £3000 per year for this which has been enough to ensure that everyone is able to be treated in the first stages which saves life and prevents complications.

Kilimatinde Hospital has set its own 4 year health plan which aligns itself to the health care improvement plans of the government, for the benefit of the population it serves. Long term health conditions which were once rare in third world countries are now becoming common in Tanzania. The hospital seeks to open a diabetic clinic, heart failure clinic and a community pharmacy, plus dentistry.

There are bungalows owned by the hospital which are occupied by hospital staff while they are working in Kilimatinde. The Kilimatinde Trust uses one to provide accommodation to medical students who spend elective placements at the hospital. This bungalow has running water in the bathroom and a flushing toilet.

Please pray for the staff and patients of Kilimatinde Hospital, many of the patients are unable to pay for hospital treatment and require support. Because of its faith based service it never turns anyone away, it's a remarkable hospital based on Christian foundations.

Recent additions to service are the appointment of a radiographer. The X Ray has been used during my visit. Also the appointment of a dentist (government funded). Maternity services now have an ultrasound machine which provides a safer environment for women and babies. Further plans for improvement include an improvement to anaesthetic services as the current anaesthetic machine is not fit for purpose and requires replacing.

Kilimatinde Hospital 1st year plan in response to government's health strategic plan Jan 23-24:-

The overall aim is to increase the number of people using the hospital by developing services people need.

Re-establish the nutrition project hospital garden.

Open a community pharmacy, which will enable people to get what they need on site and reduce lost revenue.

To improve safety of patients by increasing it oxygen availability
