New Year Reflection

It is a standing joke. Can we get through a conversation or a meeting without someone mentioning the "B" word? Seriously, though, whatever solution Theresa May comes up with, a significant part of the population of our country is going to be very unhappy with it. Up to half of us regard the EU as an evil to be escaped from at any cost, and many on the other side see it as an important force for peace, prosperity and stability in the modern world and view the movement for us to leave as evil.

Whatever way forward Mrs May finds, our world is full of evil. You can't avoid it. If you consider even just the 20th Century, that had two world wars and (at least) two holocausts. These are far worse evils than any of us have to deal with. In every century there have been great evils – persecutions, slavery, torture, earthquakes, disasters, diseases, bubonic plague, wars and famines to name a few. Give thanks that we don't experience most of these today.

The last line of the Lord's Prayer (before giving God the ultimate glory) asks God not to lead us into temptation but to deliver us from evil. It's difficult to avoid evil, even with God's help, so what does that mean? If you are a persecuted Christian in Northern Nigeria, a Pakistani believer wrongly imprisoned for "blasphemy" or a Syrian refugee from Isis, why hasn't God spared you the consequences of these evils?

This verse starts with "do not bring us into temptation". Popularly, "temptation" is associated with chocolates or a beautiful woman (or man) who isn't your spouse; something that will draw you away from "the straight and narrow". But actually the prayer means "help us not to be drawn away from God". It is more an expression of your will and your intention to do what you can to stay close to God than it is about asking for God's assistance in evading evil.

The Greek word for "evil" (*ponerou*) means "the evil one" – the one who causes or allows bad things to happen, which Christians usually understand as Satan. Who Satan is and where he comes from is not a question I am going to try to answer here, but consider this: there are influences and people who would draw us away from God and prevent us from enjoying his forgiveness and his love. The end of this prayer is not to prevent bad things from happening to us, nor to insulate us from evil in the world. The end of the prayer is for us to stay close to God whatever happens to us and not let anything or anyone drive a wedge between us and the Lord who made heaven and earth, caused his beloved son to suffer the worst consequences of evil, and, through him, gives us power to be called his children.

God bless you and protect you and keep you close to him. With love, **Andrew**

It's strange isn't it how we subconsciously seek the things we can't have, even if it is as second hand experience! I have just had my second knee replacement and the recovery is slow and painful. I have spent much of the Festive Season indoors, with limited short trips out in the car to prevent me from going stir crazy!

I felt drawn to read a Stuart Maconie book all about his walking experiences in the Lakes (completing The Wainwrights), Derbyshire, Cornwall and Scotland. Now I'm not that keen a walker, but I do enjoy a stroll through magnificent and varied countryside and coastal routes, plus over the last few years I have missed the views, fresh air and freedom such rambling allows - be it Summerhill, North York Moors, the land around my sister's home in the Borders or the river bank near my sister and brother in law's lodge in Sedbergh or around the Blue Lagoon. As I force myself through the painful daily exercise regime set out by my physio I pray that by the summer these memories will become a reality again for me. I miss being able to walk my dog around the area, where I love observing signs of the seasons, meeting neighbours and fellow dog walkers. Through the written word I am still able to experience these pleasures – but only in my head...

Everyday activities which I enjoy or take for granted are limited – cooking, ironing, gardening even sitting at a table to eat, or carrying washing upstairs and bringing things downstairs are all a challenge. But with thought and planning I am able to achieve most of these things to some degree. I have learnt to think out of the box and adapt my approaches.

My sleep is often disturbed but I use my wakeful hours to read, listen to music and pray - as a result I don't feel over tired after only a few hours of sleep throughout the night.

I have to have faith that all will be okay in the end, but I just don't know how long it will take to fully recover and what complications may arise along the way! But I do feel that I have been surrounded in prayer and although unable to get to church I have felt God's nearness at times of need. I have pushed to retrieve my lost independence – but have been so grateful for the help I have received from friends and family along the way. Dear friends,

Well, how time flies! I can't believe it is nearly Christmas again already. Preparations here for Christmas are in full swing. Well, actually they aren't. In this Buddhist land, we are barely getting over Halloween.

Signs of Christmas are yet to emerge and when they do, they will be almost exclusively Santa-themed. Officially, they don't do Christmas here, it is just a regular working day. However, to prevent any possibility of faint murmurs of discontent, the Gregorian calendar New Year is a holiday, which is a welcome break. I write this accompanied by the throbbing rhythms from a fixed, albeit floating, restaurant's houseband invading my senses. It's from the other side of the river but a stone's throw from our house. I keep telling myself that it is far less bad than the open-air karaoke bar neighbours, who forced us to leave our previous home in search of pastures new and quieter. However, there is no doubt that the riverside of the capital city in which we live is being spoiled/undergoing development and it feels like it's stalking us! We have paid rent on this house until the end of February but this has not stopped us looking for other potential places to stay. We invested quite a lot of time, energy and money into making this place feel more suitable as a home. I think deep down that neither of us really wants to face another move, but unless some merciful soul slips the mooring ropes and allows our entertaining friends to float off downstream and out of ear-shot, then we may be left with no other option.

Workwise, things plod on; in some ways it hardly seems any time since we returned here from the UK.

Since I am no longer teaching English, I do appreciate having more time to focus on ministry and yet, as those of you who have "retired" can probably testify, it is still a mystery where all the time goes. Things still feel pretty much up in the air with regards to my new role – not yet having an office or even a desk at my as yet hypothetical workplace no doubt compounds this feeling. My main "partner in crime" in the "hospital" ministry only returned to this country just over a week ago, so we will be meeting up to discuss future plans and how we set about making the work sustainable beyond our own time here.

An important part of my work is trying to draw up a list of resources. It is my hope that we will be able to connect people in need to people who can offer them the right kind of help in coping with addictions or in avoiding being trafficked etc., whatever their problems.

It will obviously take time before people get it but I believe what we are pioneering here is so necessary and so worthwhile and will be a real blessing, in a country where mental health services are next to non-existent. Please pray about all of this. Church of the Holy Spirit (CHS) continues with the usual events hopefully taking place at Advent and Christmas. A Gospel Music Festival is taking place this weekend. Please pray that many hearts and minds will be touched by this event. It is a marvellous testimony to the faith and courage of the local believers who have worked so hard to bring it into being.

We have a new house helper, Nimid, niece of Bouakham (our former house help). Nimid recently finished school and moved to the capital to study accounting at a Korean college in the morning and works for us in the afternoon. She comes from a difficult family background as her parents separated and at one point she was living on her own with her younger brother. CHS is helping to support her 13 year old younger brother who is currently at a Christian drug rehab centre.

Aden and Thomas have begun to settle into Penang International Football School. PIFS seems to compete in many local tournaments as well as "friendlies". Aden played a tournament with them in his second week... in the fourth week both boys were in a tournament on the same team! We are still hoping that the boys' "friendship opportunities" will continue to grow. It doesn't seem as easy to arrange social "playdates" as it was in the UK somehow maybe because the people we meet most are as busy as we are! There was a pause "of sorts" when we reached Quarter Break. No travelling around for us though. We did enough of that getting here! A couple of opportunities

came to Aden in Grade 4 that have not yet reached Thomas (in Grade 2). During November Aden was selected for a School Track and Field team, and acquitted himself well – dedicated training and great participation. It is great to hear him talking about "the team" as his priority. He also successfully joined the School Drama group and performed their contemporary Christmas Nativity.

Sylvia Smith, 18/3/33 – 3/12/18

Sylvia Cloke was born in Hartlepool on 18th March 1933. With her younger sister Dorothy she was brought up in the family home in Welldeck Road. She went to Jesmond Road School and, passing the 11+ exam, went on to the High School for Girls. She went to St Luke's Brownies and Guides and showed an early interest in amateur dramatics, taking part in a school production of Dido & Anaeus, then going on to join the St Luke's Players – and the ICI Synthonia Players. Leaving school at 16, she went to work at ICI, released part time to study typing and shorthand at college.

She also joined the Sea Rangers and eventually started to get to know a member of the Sea Cadets, one Alan Smith. They first met at a Christmas Party for both organizations. It was interesting that they belonged to the Sea Rangers and Cadets, because neither of them could swim! They didn't like water and they refrained from going out in boats. However the organizations did do one thing for Sylvia and Alan. And just as soon as they were able to, at the end of Alan's National Service, they were married at St Luke's Church, on 1st September 1956. As many young married couples did in those days, they lived with Alan's widowed mum Mildred at first. Never ones to borrow money, they saved for a home of their own until their first child was on the way and Mildred was re-marrying so they had to move out. Their first home was in Blakelock Road where they stayed for about 5 years, before moving to a larger house in Oakland Avenue, which was Sylvia's home for the next 50 years, and where they brought up their children Christopher and Eleanor. Eventually, and she had to wait guite a long time for this, she had two grandsons Aden and Thomas.

When her children were at school, Sylvia went back to college and qualified to teach typing and shorthand, taking on a post at the Technical College as a teacher. She also, for a while, worked for the Sports Mail as a copy taker. For those of us who find it difficult to remember what it was like before we had electronic communications, this meant taking reports over the phone using shorthand, typing them up - and then sending the typescripts up to the Sub-editor's department on the next floor. Her offspring were pressed into service as runners. Another part time job she did was with W A Smith, the insurance brokers.

For holidays Sylvia and Alan took their children to Butlins at Filey, Ayr and Minehead and then they acquired a tent. Eventually Sylvia decided

she didn't want to camp any more, so they bought a static caravan at Winston Bridge, near Barnard Castle. Although she had given up her amateur dramatics when she married, Sylvia maintained a close interest in her children's performances. She also sang in the Women's Circle choir.

From the early 1980s, Sylvia became involved with Hartlepool's Hospice, throwing herself into fund raising and working as a volunteer in their shop. She always enjoyed fancy dress, but now she found a starring role dressed as a mascot dog at fundraising events. She played a significant part in establishing the Hospice in those early days before it became wholly professionalized.

Much of her life changed when Alan died suddenly in 1988. Although she continued to be deeply committed to the Hospice, much of the rest of her life seemed to go into limbo. Eventually, she started to find her own feet again. She started enjoying walking holidays in the Lake District with her cousin Vera. She had never gone abroad, but now for the first time in her life she acquired a passport and she ventured not only to London where Chris had settled, but to Paris on the, then, quite new Eurostar.

Eventually, at the behest of her son, she started going to Stranton Church and found herself being taken in by the church family here. For the next 15 years of her life she never looked back; she helped with SMACC and the Holiday Club, joined the choir and the MU, becoming its secretary. At St Matthew's Hall she played carpet bowls and did flower arranging and decoupage. When a contemplative prayer group started, she joined it. She was a core member of this church family and all of us, as family, mourn that she has gone now.

To her grandchildren she was determinedly "Nana Sylvia" and never "Grannie Smith" which, I gather, was a family wind-up line. She doted on Aden and Thomas and she was only frustrated that she wasn't able to see more of them in her declining years. She had a serious, committed and quite profound Christian spirituality that came out when I visited her – she was not only interested in prayer, but she prayed herself with intent.

At the weekend, as well as witnessing a wedding between a 91 and 72-year-old church members (yes really), I had the privilege of sharing a mini-teaching with the vibrant and welcoming Church we were based at in Budapest, followed by the team praying for the congregation after the service. One of my favourite memories.





followed by four hectic days teaching/leading activities in four schools (children aged 10 to 14), two evenings in a recording studio making CDs in English to be sent across Europe to encourage young people in their faith, as well as outreach in the centre of Budapest, the streets bustling with Christmas shoppers.



Our final meal before flying back was traditional Goulash soup and 'Chimney' Cake at Palanta Mission, our youth mission partners in Budapest. We thanked God for a memorable week.



One of the main principles we are learning at Charis Bible College is to trust God and His word, to obey beyond our natural mind and feelings (Heb 11 v1). When I felt rather disappointed about the prospect of spending time predominately in schools, instead of going out evangelising or doing talks in Church, I wanted to trust God's plan rather than my own. As the Luke verse confirmed before we left, God had 'appointed' and ordered our steps. For me in amazing and surprising ways...as I gave words of knowledge as we ministered, preached the gospel to 12-13 year olds and helped record bible stories to be sent out around Eastern and Western Europe.

As we move into 2019, may I encourage you (and me) to look to God and see what He will do.

Pilgrim Course

Rev'd Andrew Craig is praying about whether to lead a Christian nurture course called the **Pilgrim Course**.
