From the Home Front

I have just spent Holy Week visiting in the South of England. It was lovely to spend time with our son and his wife in their new home as they prepare for the arrival of their first baby. We enjoyed a day in the georgian city of Bath, where my other half and I thoroughly enjoyed the architecture and our first foray into a city we had never visited before. We continued over to Surrey to visit friends near where we used to live. We spent time in the sunshine visiting the stunning RHS Wisley Gardens, where the blossom trees looked beautiful. Then onto Bluebell Woods at Hatchlands – magical. A visit to the Muslim War Memorial Peace Garden was a quiet tranquil retreat from the bustle of the world around us. The countryside was bursting with new growth, the area was affluent and amenities were plentiful.



On our return to Hartlepool we popped into Sainsbury's in Murray Street and had a rude awakening to the reality of other people's lives here in the area where 'Skint Britain – friends without benefits' was filmed. As we were leaving an unkempt, gaunt man walked purposefully towards the store exit with a bulging carrier bag, but he was challenged by an assistant at the door. On being asked to show what was in his bag he shouted, 'I've paid for it..' and in the ensuing argument and the tussle that took place, the bag ripped and 6 or more packs of bacon fell to the floor and the man rushed out leaving the assistant shaken but unharmed. He was trying to shop lift – bacon is a typical easy steal, which can be sold quickly for cash to feed addictions.

The realities of this side of life are often unknown to many people in the affluent home counties – but we see it almost every day here in the North. We saw only 2 homeless people during our week away – but 3 or 4 in one trip around the shops in the town centre here!

These sharp contrasts brought me up short. It came to me again that Jesus reminded us that the poor would always be with us - yet he told us to treat others as we would wish to be treated; to love our neighbours; feed the hungry and visit the sick and imprisoned and to entertain angels unaware...

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 2018

FINANCE REPORT

The overall financial out-turn for Stranton Church in the year to 31^{st} December 2018 was a small deficit of £36, (2017 deficit – £3,157), but with a continuing underlying deficit in the Church General fund, as shown below.

It should be noted that St Matthew's Community Centre surpluses are agreed as available for the upkeep and development of the Centre, not as a source of funding for general Church activities.

The main reason for the deficit was a fall of 11% in overall income, mainly in total giving by regular members: analysis of the reasons for this were discussed at the PCC in October, at which we identified the underlying reason as significant change in the make-up of our congregations: we have become too dependent over the last ten years or so on a small number of generous donors, who have contributed a disproportionate share of general income: of those members, a significant number have recently died, moved away, or experienced significant change in circumstances leading to a large, permanent reduction in our annual Church income of about £27,000: over £500 per week.

Unfortunately despite some regular and generous individual revisions, for which we are most grateful, individual giving by members of the congregation has not uniformly kept pace with inflation – a common problem for Churches where bank standing orders are a main method of giving but not subject to regular uplift and review by their originators. Accordingly the PCC agreed to join a new national "Parish Giving Scheme" based on Direct Debit mandates which can allow and prompt for annual inflationary uplifts, and the Church is encouraging personal recommitment to resourcing our ministry in Stranton through that scheme, or by members revising their existing arrangements. The new scheme will speed up cash flow especially of Gift Aid tax recovery, and reduce the local administration, whilst also keeping the records completely confidential.

We are also facing inflationary increases in our parish lay staffing costs which now constitute about one third of our budget: Our budget for 2019 has therefore been set by reducing our parish share contribution to Diocesan costs (which is used to meet clergy housing and stipend costs) from £57,000 to £30,000, which would still leave a "faith gap" deficit of around £5,000, of which we seek at least £3,000 to be met by new and updated commitments.

I am immensely grateful, as ever, to those members of the Church who give so generously of their time to help with the day to financial administration, and make my job as treasurer possible, especially to Maureen Anderson (Assistant Treasurer), Barbara Butcher (St Matthew's Treasurer) and Ken Shepherd and his volunteers who organise and supervise cash counting and banking.

A copy of our budget for 2019 is set out below: this shows that to meet the projected deficit we will need increase regular giving by 9% from new or existing members, or from other sources

Our financial plans for 2019 include some important investments for improvements in amenities and accessibility in our premises: St Matthew's Community Centre has been very successful in attracting grant funding for a new kitchen and accessible toilets, £90,000 of which is shown as received and carried forward in 2018 accounts and these building works should be completed around Easter 2019. The PCC has also approved accessibility alterations in the main Church building, and has started the faculty legal process to carry out various internal works, including door and handrail changes at the front of Church and an accessible toilet and hot drinks facility in what is now the Vicar's vestry, which along with any significant expenditure to be met following our Electrical Safety Review we expect to fund from a combination of Trust Fund monies held on our behalf by the Diocese and grant applications.

BELLRINGING REPORT

We continued to ring as a part of the D&N Association "Ringing to Remember" activity whereby towers ring their bells on the 100th anniversary of the death of a ringer from their tower who was killed during World War One. It was also pleasing that all ringable bells in Hartlepool were rung on 11th November as part of the Armistice celebrations.

The call in action

Dear friends,

After a mere four years in our house (compared to nine in our first house here) with the almost constant noise of construction work during the day and loud music from a restaurant boat, moored permanently on the river and less than 100 metres from our wooden first storey bedroom, we had had enough. Unlike our previous house - which we had left due to the arrival of the open-air karaoke bar, but with heavy hearts after much soul -searching because of the good relations we'd built up with our neighbours - we felt very few misgivings this time. It was a measure of how much the city is changing, that the neighbourhood we left this time around was far less cohesive. This was due to the construction of apartment blocks and a higher proportion of shorter-term tenancies, in place of the local family homes, which largely formed our previous neighbourhood. Now, 14 years on from when we first moved in, that neighbourhood is also almost unrecognisable, as "development" takes hold. So we have moved! Welcome to the "burbs"... still only about five km from the city centre, at least our new place is in a relatively tranguil location (for now!). The only qualification is that we have a Buddhist temple with a small community of monks as neighbours. The downside is the fact that the monks are early risers, and we mean really early. On certain mornings at 4.30am (well, we are not entirely sure of the time because we try not to take notice), they bang their absolutely massive drums to remind the locals to wake up and cook food for them. Just after 6am, the monks walk around the village with large baskets to collect the sticky rice etc that the villagers offer them as alms. The monks remind the people of their arrival by again banging on their big drum, with some gongs bashing and cymbals clashing along for good measure. The village dogs just love this and summon up the most amazing chorus of howls and yowls to join in greeting the new day! All of which is - believe it or not - far preferable to the invasive din of construction and unremarkable live music that we endured prior to this move. We praise God for his goodness in providing us with what is otherwise an oasis of calm, to find rest for our bodies, minds and souls, away from the intensifying changes affecting so much of the city. Encouragingly, it also retains some of the neighbourly feel we encountered when we first moved to this country. Please pray that we will be able to make good connections with local people and others around us. It is a busy time with church as Easter approaches.

This year is complicated by the fact that many people will be away because Holy Week coincides with the main holiday of the year here: Lunar New Year (the Buddhist rather than the Chinese version). The city stops to enjoy several days of partying, visits to temples and water fights, which can amount to a lot of fun. We have lived here long enough to have experienced the discordant culture clash of the sombre remembering of Good Friday, while all around us the rest of the city indulges in a huge rowdy party with inescapable, accompanying music blaring from all directions. Thankfully, rather than being slap-bang in the middle of the festivities, the Easter weekend comes after the bulk of the serious partying is over but many people won't have returned from their escapes. Please pray for us, that the joy of Easter and that the Good Friday and Easter Day services may be a source of real encouragement and hope to whoever is around to worship with us.

- Anna has started her GCSE exams; please pray that the remaining exams go well.
- Pray for good friendships for the children and their sense of identity.
 Anna made an interesting comment the other day she said that she was half Asian on the inside
- Pray for Innes as he is dissatisfied with school. He has teachers who are teaching subjects that are not their subject and, in some cases, are openly unenthusiastic about the subjects they are teaching.
- Euan won third place in a recent school spelling bee and his group, "Euan's group", won three trophies at the school science fair. It was good to see Euan taking on a leadership role as usually he just follows on and joins in rather than taking a lead.



Mary Baines' Recipe

Chocolate mint mousse

Place 220g chopped dark chocolate in a small heat proof dish & stand over a pan of simmering water until chocolate has melted & is smooth – cool slightly.
