### Lessons from history – things change...

If you think Brexit seriously divides our nation at the moment, imagine what it was like during the middle of the 16th Century in England, when religion was the political issue of the day and hundreds of academics, clergy and officials were summarily executed, many of them by burning, for belonging to the "wrong" branch of Christianity. The following Century, in 1616, an inquisition established by the (Roman) Catholic Church declared that Galileo Galilei's belief that the Sun, not the Earth, is at the centre of the universe is "foolish and absurd in philosophy, and formally heretical since it explicitly contradicts in many places the sense of Holy Scripture". In our country the question of whether God ordained (or pre-destined) a person to be King and gave him an absolute right to rule (or not) resulted in a brutal civil war that was ended when the King himself was beheaded. Things had settled down somewhat by the 18th Century: subversive non-conformists to the state religion were mutilated (had parts cut off), but were not usually executed. They were all Christians! In the 19th Century, society as a whole was "Christian" but evils such as slavery and child labour were only slowly and controversially abolished alongside the diseases (e.g. cholera) and depravations of the Industrial Revolution that made Great Britain into a World Power. Charles Darwin was criticised and lampooned for proposing that humankind and all of life was subject to a process of evolution and had not been created in 4004BC, as the Bible seemed to suggest. Two World Wars were waged in the 20<sup>th</sup> Century, mainly between "Christian" nations. Only from the middle of that century did increased global communications and immigration from Muslim and Hindu countries force most Christians to start asking what God thinks of people from other cultures and faiths. Most people assumed that only a man could be a church leader – it wasn't until 1994 that any women were ordained priests in the Church of England. Today the most divisive issue facing the Church seems to be whether people who aren't in conventional heterosexual relationships can be accepted as full members of the Body of Christ and leaders of his Church.

I have certain nostalgia for an earlier age when there was more deference and common assumptions about right beliefs and right living that seemed to be based on Biblical truth. Nowadays "is it true?" seems to be a less important question than "does it work for me?" Having a vast amount of information at our fingertips, we rely on electronic devices to inform us and entertain us. Values and truth are formed more than ever by the media - without much distinction between reality, "virtual reality" and personal opinion – certainly not by a common faith or a common story that links us together.

When Society's understanding about God and God's truth has changed so much over the centuries and continues to evolve more rapidly than ever, how can we assert that God doesn't change? What constant can we hold on to and proclaim with confidence, knowing that it will be the same in every future age as well as the past?

"Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and for ever" (Heb. 13:8) "so do not be swept off course by all sorts of outlandish teachings; it is good that we should gain inner strength from the grace of God and not from rules . . . Through Jesus let us continually offer up to God a sacrifice of praise, that is, the tribute of lips which acknowledge his name. Never neglect to show kindness and to share what you have with others, for such are the sacrifices which God approves."

And "May the God of peace, who brought back from the dead our Lord Jesus, the great Shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of an eternal covenant, make you perfect in all goodness so that you may do his will; and may he create in us what is pleasing to him, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory for ever and ever! Amen" . (Heb. 13:20) With love,

### From the Home Front

Recently I have found that God has been challenging me in my life. I know I often don't relish or welcome these challenges, nonetheless I also know I have to be obedient and trust in the wisdom and love of my heavenly Father and the promptings of the Holy Spirit...

In May I handed in my notice to terminate my teaching contract and take retirement after 42 years in the profession. I felt physically sick and tearful for days beforehand and when I gave my letter to the Headteacher I was quite distressed. Fortunately she just hugged me! However so many concerns are still running through my thoughts - I worry that "being a teacher" is my identity, how people see me and my status in society. I have also been the main wage earner for many of my 42 years in schools – how will we manage without my regular salary? I know I will miss my colleagues, many of whom have become good friends over the years, also I will miss the children who never cease to fascinate me and I learn so much from them! Plus of course the myriad challenges to my knowledge that I have had to surmount and solve everyday! The Lord has confirmed that this is the right time to finish, while I still love my work and enjoy going to school each morning.

I have felt prompted to look into volunteering as my circumstances are about to change, God has pushed me towards two areas. One is to work with Safe Families. After a difficult experience pursuing fostering a few years ago, I was really apprehensive. However the groundwork and training so far have been a positive and affirming experience. Now I have to trust that God will use me in the way He wants, in a new context with adults and children. I was also approached to take part in a drugs trial – at several points I told God I would be willing to stop if I didn't meet the criteria – wishful thinking! The process is likely to be complicated at times with travelling, monitoring, injections and blood tests, yet I feel I am being allowed to give something back to the Health Service which has been there for me since before I was born.

In church a couple of times I have been physically shaken by the Holy Spirit and instructed to speak words to the congregation – this is really frightening as I feel exposed to ridicule and terrified I might physically fall down... Yet I am becoming more obedient and trusting enough to stand up and go to the front – with encouragement and acceptance from Norman.

Even the boundaries of my quiet times are being pushed – to do another Bible reading at the end of the day, in addition to my morning devotional!

But so far I have coped with everything God has lain on my heart – and I have to trust that He will continue to give me the courage, strength, time and grace to see through all that He requires in the sure knowledge that He will use each area for the glory of His Kingdom....

### Margaret Elizabeth Lumley

I first met Margaret when I was transferred to Stranton and found her a lovely spiritual lady with her 3<sup>rd</sup> Order Franciscan commitment to service which has been more than evident in her quiet and devoted service to Stranton Church. She had an all embracing commitment to service. This became evident to me when she volunteered to join my first team to serve seafarers in our new Seafarers' Centre at Seal Sands for The Mission to Seafarers – a most unlikely candidate I thought at the time!

To volunteer to serve seafarers of all nationalities and faiths and to 'Meet them as they are' and extend a hand of Christian Fellowship regardless of creed. To learn to pull a pint of beer or help them to phone home and wrestle with the technology at that time to enable them to speak to their families across the world.

These were most unlike Margaret - but she embraced it with enthusiasm and her spirit of service rooted in her Christian spirituality was evident to everyone. She served faithfully for more than 20 years while I was Chaplain and continued long after I left. She faithfully served her ministry every week at the Seafarers' Centre, usually not returning home until well after 11pm, after the last seafarer had returned to their ship.

She engaged in conversation (sometimes deep conversation) with seafarers with a quiet listening and compassionate manner – reflecting her own spirituality and 'met people where they were'.

I remember many times when I had gone home from the Centre and Margaret would telephone to tell me she had met a seafarer who perhaps needed a little counselling or a chat and would pass on the name of the ship etc., so we could keep a watch on him. She was very sensitive to a silent cry for help.

Seafarers would ask sometimes "Where is Mama?", if she wasn't on duty that night.

A lovely deeply spiritual lady who served faithfully both her Church and The Mission to Seafarers and a most unlikely person to embrace the rough world of shipping and seafarers - you couldn't imagine - but she did it faithfully and I know she left a lasting impression on all those seafarers she met, cared for, and (I sincerely believe), helped them on their own spiritual journey.

### Hunger

## Did you know that 3 million children in the UK are at risk of going hungry during the school holidays?

With the loss of free school meals given out during term time, in addition to the extra childcare costs around the holidays, families already struggling with low budgets find it difficult to feed their children.

#### The need:

The All Party Parliamentary Group (APPG) on hunger published a report earlier this year which showed that hunger amongst children during the school holidays may exacerbate inequalities that already exist between children from wealthier and poorer backgrounds. Those children most at risk of hunger during the holidays may also suffer from social isolation, loneliness, and inactivity. These factors combined can lead to significant weight loss or gain, and negative impacts on physical and mental well-being.

#### Holiday Clubs offer four main advantages:

Socialising and activities for children

Financial relief for parents on very low incomes

Skill building for parents and pathways to future work

Improved physical and mental health, setting children up to excel in their studies after the holidays

Each of these advantages improves children's quality of life, as well as their chances of growing up to become healthy, well-educated adults, while simultaneously increasing parents' confidence and adding to their skills base.

Holiday Food Clubs are also an excellent way to promote social inclusion through food, and that they add an important element of happiness and community to the lives of those families who are supported.

It was wonderful to read and hear some of their testimonies on this path towards a fuller relationship with God and our Saviour. The Holy Spirit had worked quietly or mightily in each person's life to bring them to this point.



Amir, Shadi, Sara and Sajad were given candles and told – 'You have received the light of Christ; walk in this light all the days of your life – Shine as a light in the world to the glory of God the Father'.

Sara gave an incredibly moving testimony about her struggles being a Christian in Iran and the passive and active persecution she experienced for her faith. This led to her long and

difficult journey to GB via Greece, where she had faced further persecution and aggression. Despite the horrors she has experienced she is so grateful to have a Loving Father and Living God to follow and to give her support. All of us who heard her words felt grateful and humbled – how would we have come through such persecution? She, and others with similar backgrounds are an inspiration to us all – Praise God.

Bishop Paul used the story of St Barnabas - the Encourager - from Acts. He described Barnabas' life and actions to show how God can use each one of us to come alongside those who have no or little faith and to encourage them to find and grow in their relationship with God and to become obedient to His calling and prompts. An inspirational story when you consider Barnabas championed Paul when he was newly converted and suspected of being a 'double agent' on a mission to track down and persecute Christians. Barnabas also supported Mark through his times of doubt and Mark ended up writing a Gospel! Bishop Paul commissioned all those being confirmed and the entire congregation to be like Barnabas and become encouragers...

All those who were confirmed huddled around Bishop Paul for a reassuring chat about the way forward with Christ firmly In their lives.
