# And finally . . .

Many thanks for all the kind messages and cards, generous presents and goodwill that attended the party in July to celebrate my "retirement". It was a wonderful, happy, humbling occasion that will stick in our memory for some time.

It is not normal for clergy to "stay put" when they retire, but that is what Elspeth and I plan to do, at least for the short term. However we will mainly "disappear" for at least the 6 months that is the minimum the Bishop will allow for retiring clergy before considering giving them "permission to officiate" (i.e. lead services, baptise people and conduct weddings and funerals). Even then it is not certain what we will do after that. It will bear little resemblance to the ministry I have had the privilege of being part of to this point. So thank you all for having been partners in this ministry - and pray with us that we will find the new path and patterns through which God in Jesus can be glorified.

One of the better known passages in the Old Testament is in Ecclesiastes Chapter 3 - "For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: a time to be born and a time to die . . . " - and so on. Sometimes people stop reading this too quickly. The passage doesn't make much sense without the later verses: " ... I know that whatever God does endures for ever; nothing can be added to it, nor anything taken from it; God has done this, so that all should stand in awe before him".

I can't think of a better way of signing off (for the time being, at least) than with words from the hymn we sang on the 15<sup>th</sup> of July: "Angels, help us to adore him - you behold him face to face. Sun and moon bow down before him, dwellers all in time and space. Alleluia, praise with us the God of grace".

May the blessing of God, Heavenly Father, who is the alpha and the omega, the beginning and the end of everything; His Son who revealed His love for us through his reconciling sacrifice; and His Holy Spirit who will touch us with that love if only we will open ourselves up to receive it - be yours now and in all the future time that God gives you to serve him. **Andrew**

After an hour's work the plants all looked better – more upright, fuller, ready to bloom, and produce again...

We then had a trip to the beach with our grandson – we dug in the sand, splodged in the sea and sat in the sunshine. After a while we were all sandy, damp, sweaty and uncomfortable, but a cooling ice-cream and a walk in the shade of trees in the park followed by long glasses of cool water soon revived us.





A large number of Stranton and Burbank congregations joined with family, friends and supporters of Clive and Michelle to attend their ordination to the priesthood at Durham Cathedral which was presided over by Bishop Paul and Bishop Sarah.

The eleven ordinands were presented to Bishop Paul by the Archdeacons. Their calling and faith were affirmed and legal checks verified. The Bishop declared to the congregation the roles of a priest and asked the ordinands to affirm their faith and spoke of how they were to fashion their future lives as servants of Jesus. Prayers were said over each ordinand by their sending ministers and hymns were sung. Then all the candidates were each signed with the cross, using Holy Oil, on their hands. Then Bishop Paul blessed each one with the power of the Holy Spirit. The training incumbents (Norman for Clive and Michelle) moved their stoles from a diagonal sash to a scarf position as a sign of their status. They were then presented to the congregation amidst thunderous applause.

They all helped administer communion to everyone attending. At the end of the service Bishop Paul led the new priests back to the font where he gave each one a Bible as a sign of the authority given to them by God to preach the gospel of Christ and to minister the Holy Sacraments. **J.A.R.**





## **Margaret Lumley – remembering the early years**

Firstly I want to thank you for all your prayers, expressions of sympathy and practical help to me and to other relatives on the occasion of the sad loss of my sister, Margaret. Also I have much appreciated all the kindnesses shown to Margaret by those at Stranton All Saints, especially in her later years of failing health.

Margaret and I were born in West Hartlepool and baptised at Stranton All Saints Church in 1936 and 1938 respectively.

With our mother (and at first also Grandma) Margaret and I spent four and a half very happy years in Swaledale during the Second World War. Our first memories of church were attending Sunday School and Evensong at the village church, Holy Trinity in Low Row, Swaledale. (Margaret's ashes have now been buried in the churchyard there in the valley she loved).

Our schooling began in the little village school at Low Row. After her first day at school, Margaret declared to our mother that when she grew up wanted to be a school teacher; Margaret never waivered from that ambition.

Those wonderful days of freedom to wander the beautiful countryside were replaced by town life when we returned to West Hartlepool shortly before the end of the war. We lived in Lister Street, attended Lister Street School and Stranton Church Sunday School was based there too until after the war, when it moved to St Matthew's. In our teenage years we were confirmed at Stranton and from then on very regularly went to the 8am Communion Service and to Evensong.

Loving, caring parents provided a stable background and encouraged us in all our activities: YPU, Brownies and later Girl Guides, music lessons, and later when we were at the High School for Girls we enrolled at the College of Art's Saturday morning classes for children. At home we busied ourselves with various art and craft activities. The local parks and gardens, seaside rocks and beaches and surrounding countryside were there to be explored and enjoyed by walking or bicycling. We were joined in many of our activities by Margaret's friend Margaret Bradley. A friendship that lasted from the day Margaret started at Lister Street School to the present: over 75 years.

On leaving school Margaret trained to be a teacher at Scarsbrick Hall (C of E Teacher Training College) and then she taught in Hartlepool, mostly at Golden Flatts Primary School until her retirement.

I think many of you at Stranton know more than I do of her many church and other activities with which Margaret was involved in her adult life and over the years the help she gave to many in giving lifts and visiting sick and elderly.

By contrast after school and study in Hull I taught briefly at March, in the Fens and then worked in a government unit in London, but I have continued to come back to Hartlepool frequently and have always thought of it as my home town and Stranton All Saints as my home church. But now with mobility and health problems I am unable to return as much.

I thank God for His goodness in guiding and protecting the lives of Margaret and me all our days.

# Mary Baines' Recipes

#### **Pork Spare Ribs**

2lbs ribs 8 tablespoons vinegar 8 tablespoons pineapple juice 8 tablespoons water 3 tablespoons lemon juice + extra 3 tablespoons brown sugar 1 tablespoon tomato sauce 2 level teaspoons ginger Good pinch of salt 1 desertspoon cornflour Dry mustard powder



Mix dry ingredients in pan, add wet ingredients - bring to boil. Sprinkle ribs with dry mustard powder and additional lemon juice - roast for 10 minutes uncovered then pour on sauce and cook for 30 minutes more.

Serve with rice

#### **Ginger Shortbread**

 $\frac{1}{2}$  lb plain flour 1/4 lb margarine  $\frac{1}{2}$  level teaspoon bicarb soda  $\frac{1}{2}$  dessert spoon ground ginger 1/4 lb brown sugar 1 tablespoon golden syrup 1/2 level teaspoon cream of tartar Pinch of salt

Cream the margarine and sugar, add syrup & then remainder of dry ingredients.

Put into a greased tin & press down lightly with back of damp spoon Cook in slow oven 150C, Gas 3. When cool but not cold, cut into squares.


