As a boy growing up in the late 60's I sang in our local church choir. One of the highlights of the year was Harvest Festival. One Thursday in October the whole choir went to a small neighbouring village and there we sang traditional harvest hymns and the anthem for that year. But that was just the start. Mitford was an agricultural village which meant the service was followed by a really good supper. Then we would go outside and look for conkers in the grounds of the village hall. This community had a clear understanding of where their food came from, the cycles of the seasons and that it was good and right to celebrate and give thanks to God for His rich provision.

Five decades on, in a more urban context, we have perhaps lost some of that basic connection with our world. Our food comes from supermarkets and the shelves are full all year round. Yet we continue to hold Harvest Festivals, why? For me it begins by recognising that God is both creator and provider, ultimately all that we have including our food comes from God. So once a year it is good to gather together to worship God, celebrate all He has given us and come to worship in a Spirit of thanksgiving and praise. This year at both Stranton and St Luke's we will do this on Sunday 6<sup>th</sup> October. The previous night on Saturday 5<sup>th</sup> October there is a Ceilidh (traditional country dance) starting at 6.30pm in St Matthew's Community Centre when we can gather more informally for fun and fellowship. Do please join us if you can.

Harvest is also a time when we remember those who have less than we do. Part of giving thanks is an opportunity to be generous to others. At Stranton Church we will again be collecting non-perishable goods for Hartlepool Food Bank. Do please bring your gifts to worship.

After a hectic couple of months I finally retired in July and haven't stopped moving since!! The long awaited arrival of two special grandsons was joyous, but a time of anxiety and stress, followed by some hard work and broken nights helping new parents and babies adjusting to life in the world. This had left me exhausted and emotionally wrung out! A holiday was greatly needed so on the day I would normally have returned to work – we jetted off to The Canary Islands in the sun.

In Mark 6:31 Jesus said 'Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest.'

Waking up to watch the sunrise was a wonderful way to start each day – as the sun came up, lights went out in the town and the sky was a golden glow of promise....





The landscape was dry and barren and quite inhospitable in the heat, yet as clouds moved across the sky the colours of the mountains changed from reds and browns to greys and blues and sometimes a greenish hue. These light and colour variations were mesmerising.





Where the Atlantic Ocean met the volcanic coastline the forces were dramatic and powerful. It took our breath away as we stood looking down into the sea realising that the next landfall would be Florida – the breadth of the ocean was awesome! And to think God's love for us is wider and deeper than any ocean!

As we drove home from a mountain expedition we saw a dust twister develop – it grew and moved across the open valley floor, growing in width and height. Ten seconds after this photo the twister engulfed us – exciting, frightening, and an unexpected force of nature – we have never experienced such a thing before, it was like being consumed by the spirit!




The black sand and surfing waves breaking as we walked along the deserted shoreline reminded me of the Footprints poem – it felt very lonely and isolated – yet God was there with us....

This volcano totally dominated the landscape. It is over 20 million years old – how incredible is that! God fashioned this as the island was formed. It was one volcano among so many – explosive, fiery, destructive – yet from such beginnings the amazing landscape was formed and fashioned. The water cannot be seen but it lies in underground caverns and although the ground is



stony and parched, through use of windmills to bring water to the surface and irrigation, crops can grow. However the Palm trees produce honey, cactus have prickly pear fruit and Aloe Vera has amazing medicinal properties. Our awesome God was so inventive with every plant.



Our last night – we sat on our mountain side terrace – aware that man and nature meet headlong – the full moon was reflected in a tranquil sea, as a jet airplane flew over the illuminated town!

The sights we saw took our breath away at times. As we looked down from mountain tops, drove across arid pains, stood where the land abutted the oceans we were amazed by and appreciated the work of the hand of God and His

### Harvest donations and talks

The Harvest season is almost upon us and many churches are considering their giving at this time of year. We would be thrilled if you would consider giving a donation of food and/or toiletries to Hartlepool Foodbank. As we enter our busiest time of year (October to January) donations become even more important to us and allow us to provide food support to our town's most vulnerable people.

Over the last 12 months Hartlepool Foodbank has provided almost 5000 people with emergency food, supporting them through crises including job loss, illness, family bereavement, and changes to the benefit system. We have also supported many other local food providers over the summer with bulk donations of food. Chris & Ros Smith News #16 July 2019 25 Heworth Village, York YO31 1AE

We are now back in the UK and beginning to settle in to a completely new environment.

It has been a weird few weeks, not least because Chris was required to remain in Malaysia three weeks longer for reasons to do with local Malaysian tax residency rules. Ros was with Aden and Thomas and left promptly in order that they could settle in to new schools in York. This was a big prayer concern and priority for us in yet another transition but the initial signs are hopeful. We have been quite fortunate, in that the local primary school less than 10 minutes' walk from our house had two vacancies, in the correct year groups. Aden and Thomas arrived at the school just in time to join in swimming classes and end of year school trips! Aden has arrived just in time (to the envy of Thomas) to register for the Year 6 week-long Field Trip. We keep telling Thomas that he will also go on a Year 6 Field Trip eventually... The prospects look fairly good for them. This C of E Primary School is relatively small and the staff get to know the students guite well. The school "feeds" a well respected senior school. We have been amazed at the number of opportunities that come to the school – Aden has taken part in a concert by the Early Music Festival after three weeks' practice, as he was prepared well by Dalat's music and drama curriculum, and he impressed the Festival team with his musicality, so we hope to continue this link. Thomas seems interested in drums, drumming and percussion – and there are possibilities here as well. York as a city furnishes an amazing variety of activities to be part of – so the challenge is to enjoy what is here without being pulled in too many directions. One joy is that we are close enough to the City centre (about 1 mile) so that we can walk, scoot, or ride bikes to our destination, as makes most sense. We are hardly using the car at all – which is just as well, since parking can be problematic. The history in York centre, including the Minster, is (according to Historian Chris) a physical and visual treat every time we arrive.

We are trying to find our feet with local churches and have visited St Michael le Belfrey and York Community Church over several Sundays, although churches are tending to "wind down" in to the Summer when people are either away or focused on national Christian events such as New Wine. Belfrey is right in the City centre so it is quite do-able provided one is "prepared" for the walk! Ros is getting ready for her year-long Community Music Postgraduate course, which will begin in the autumn at York University. It is really nice to hear recorder music wafting around our home. Chris is in the first instance preparing to work as Supply Teaching again. There seems to be just as much opportunity up here as there was in Hertfordshire for Supply. We are still in the transition. The boys suddenly feel a little rootless again with the end of school routine. Next week they go to Rekonnect camp, designed for Third Culture Kids returning to the UK, so we hope that this will help. Finding Christian friends, keeping in touch with old friends, and enjoying York, are our prayers for them as they settle. And for their parents, too!! We have been preoccupied with setting up home but we have not actually ended our link with Teach Beyond.

We will be based in York for a long while, aiming to see both boys through their Secondary education. At the same time, however, we hope to transition to Associate membership of Teach Beyond. This means that gifts sent to Teach Beyond can still serve Mission Schools through us. We hope that Ros can find a way to use her Librarian experience to benefit other Teach Beyondlinked schools, and that we both could assist with deputation activities for Teach Beyond at Conferences or Mission events. This is still to be settled and formalised.

There is a lot to pray about in this settling in for all of us as a family, and we will continue to keep you informed about what is happening, especially about the formal relationship with Teach Beyond and how past and present financial gifts are deployed. The main principle remains the same as stated previously.

# **Up-date on Chaplaincy**

Since moving to Hartlepool 16 years ago my boys have both attended the school and I became involved with Assemblies and eventually Church moved into the school building as well.

I have been a Governor along with Angela and we helped to establish it as a Church of England Primary School. Now I feel called to be their Chaplain. My role would look something like this:-

1)**Relationships** – Building relationships with pupils and staff, by visiting school and chatting with people.

Building relationships with parents through greeting them in playground. Showing support for emotional and spiritual wellbeing of all involved with the school.

### 2) Leading in school -

Leading Worship

Leading the Eucharistic Service

Planning and leading CREATE After School Club

Acting as host at Stranton Church when school comes to visit or take services.

3) **Support spiritual growth** – This could be the development of a Communion class. This maybe for children, but also developed for Staff and Parents.

Support the sanctuary space.

Help plan and prepare special events. ie. Labyrinth, Prayer Space Day, Attend the Annual Leavers Service in Durham Cathedral.

4) **Support the teaching of RE –** If a teacher would like support for a certain subject the Chaplain could be available to help in an RE lesson. There could be a 'Big Questions' time with the children – perhaps letting pupils post letters to the Chaplain to answer.

5) **Support the leadership of the school** – Be available to support the Governing body.

Support the SIAMS (Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools) inspection schedule.

6) **Prayer** – To attend the prayer meeting and to be continually prayerful for the school. Pray for each member of the school individually.

Do please pray for this opportunity and for God's hand to be seen at work within the school.

It's great having the car again and not having to make repeat trips on our poor, overloaded little motorbike, often getting drenched!

Transport woes aside, what's been happening? As usual, church has been quieter over the summer with many of our regulars gone for extended breaks back in their home countries. However, numbers have really picked up again the last couple of Sundays. Praise God that even as we've said goodbye to some key contributors to congregational life, new arrivals have come. Please pray that some of them will make their spiritual home with us and find a niche in which to exercise their gifts both at church and beyond, reaching out to the wider community.

My new role has been pretty much on hold as the project director's wife has been ill and this has meant that the director has largely been focusing his energy on looking after her and their three children. Coupled with the fact that the new dean for this country hasn't yet started, it's ensured that the project has only really been running in a limited capacity.
