From the Home Front



Over the last few months I have felt that the parts of my life have seemed like these stones – balanced precariously, on a slope! I was trying to keep occupied as I dealt with the decline in health and care of my brother, he had learning difficulties and as a family we had always watched over Peter, giving him guidance and structure day to day in all aspects of his life, whilst still encouraging him to be as independent as possible. He had always lived at home and continued in the family home after the death of our parents. Then came an unexpected diagnosis

of cancer, our roles had become far more hands-on. Overseeing the running of his home, car and his health and care needs which had greatly increased. In early autumn a diagnosis of a terminal secondary tumour in the brain meant a complete change in my plans having just retired, as I promised Peter as pain free and comfortable care as we could manage and that he would not be alone on this walk.

Coming to terms with the regime of palliative care was emotionally wearing. Into the everyday also went helping with childcare of grandsons, church commitments, school governor demands, housework, Christmas presents, cards and preparations, consultant work in schools, decluttering the parental home and so much more. But during this time I felt talking to God and praying, plus the support and prayers of so many others was enabling me to hold everything together. Occasionally I felt something start to give under the stress, then it seem to settle again in answer to prayers.

Now we are grieving - a different walk which seems full of surprises and shocks, just when the path looks solid something is said or seen and the stones tilt and slip once more! We will come through this too in time. I thank God for all the promises we were able to keep, blessings and kindness we have received, for the love and compassion and for the many prayers - known and unknown - which have underpinned us during the last few months. By the grace of God and His faithful servants our future will have joy in it again...

PCC Burbank Report 2019

Ward Jackson School – We had Create on the 15th October. There was 31 children and 22 adults in attendance. We tried a different type of meal, instead of a buffet Shirley the cook made a hot meal and pudding. It was well received. The down side to it was more cleaning up and it was not much cheaper. The last Create of the year was on the 3rd December.

With my new DBS I have started my role as Chaplain in School. One day a week I meet with parents at the school gate and chat to people on the playground while waiting for their children. Once a week I have a meal with the children, and I then do playground duty. I am building up relationships with the staff whilst I am there. I have already spoken in a class, and a class came to church and discussed Baptism with me.

Norman and I took the Communion Service in school in November and this feels like a very special service. We pray with all the children and then have communion and give blessings to the rest of the staff. In the New Year I hope to have a discussion about starting Communion Classes. Here we can teach all about communion so that children and parents are able to take communion.

Church – We had a great service when we had the Barton Baptism Service for Ronnie, about 80 people in attendance, a great atmosphere and all went smoothly. We did a prayer walk around the school (the weather was too bad to walk around estate). This was both interesting and a spiritual time. Sensing God within the school and lots of prayers were offered.

I continue to run a small house group on Monday afternoons.

Bridge Builders – This term I have been using a book called 'Heartshaper' by David C Cook, it is a 52 sessions in one book which I am finding very helpful. There are 8-13 children now which is a slight decrease in numbers. Normally numbers tend to grow slowly over the term, but we have been having a lots of bad behaviour and three children were given red cards this term - which is a first for us.

YF. We are missing Kat and her three children at YF. I did put an advert in Signpost magazine for more leaders but did not get any response. We do enjoy trips to The Pulse which is a diocese event mainly in the Cathedral. We are still developing the 'Twin' Idea, we hope to go and visit Bethany McNeeley's group in Norton. We went to Oxford Road Baptist Church to support Apple Tree on the 8th December.

Community – The Burbank Community Centre had a Christmas fayre with tables and crafts, raffles etc.

Explorers Camp – We took 11 people to Camp last year. There will be a reunion on the 25th January. I am hoping to take a mini bus of folk down to Huddersfield. I will be going to Maggie on Mitchell Street and advertising it there soon. Plus I hope to take a few more from YF.

Personal – My IME training is going well. I have now taken a number of Church funerals both at Stranton and St Aidan's. I have also led a few baptisms at Stranton and one at Burbank Church; I have spoken at a couple of weddings and at the last one I was privileged to officiate at the marriage of the couple, alongside Norman of course!!

I have taken several Communion Services here at Stranton and I have also officiated at St Luke's Services, St Columba and Holy Trinity Services and at Ward Jackson School. They are all slightly different in the way things are done, but I am enjoying taking these services.

Foodbank – Harvest is always a good time for donations for us but this year the amount we received was lower than previous years. Our Tesco annual collection was in late November. We hope to have a shop in Middleton Grange Shopping Centre. This will do a number of things. We often can't spend enough time talking to people about their problems. So they can come to the shop for better conversations. We will also host service providers at the shop, for people to come and meet. We will be able to collect food at the shop. We will be able to give out information about Foodbank from here.



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Could you be a trustee?

Schools and churches (PCCs) are not the only organizations that need to recruit governors. There are opportunities to serve God by becoming a trustee of a registered charity. Specifically, the foodbank has vacancies that we would very much like to fill. Here are some questions and answers about this:

Q. what sort of people are we looking for?

A. People very much like you – people with a heart to serve God by helping people who are finding life difficult at the moment. Maybe you already do voluntary work, but would like an opportunity to contribute on a more strategic level.

Q. Are there any specific skills that you need?

A. Obviously you need to be articulate and able to see the "bigger picture" than just the person in front of you at the moment. As is the case for school governors, people can contribute with a wide range of skills and experience that complement and build on what other trustees bring. At the moment we would be especially interested in somebody well acquainted with social media. Someone with experience in administration, secretarial work, or management would also be very welcome. However if you don't tick those boxes that doesn't mean you should not consider applying. Let us know what you are able to bring and help us decide with you whether God has a role for you in this work.

Q. Don't trustees have some statutory responsibilities?

A. Yes they do, but the legal stuff is shared and the Board has corporate responsibilities, not individual trustees.

Q. I already have a day job. How would it work around that?

A. Meetings are held in the evening. If you were not available during the day you wouldn't be able to get involved with the day-to-day operation of the foodbank, but then that's not what trustees are really for. The Board of Trustees deals with strategic direction and manages the foodbank through our paid employees, who report to the Board.

Q. I'm already very heavily committed to other things. How much time will it take?

A. Attending about 4 meetings/year and the AGM. That's the minimum. Of course to be effective, we would expect a trustee to take an interest in the work of the foodbank, in our employees and volunteers, supporting them in particular ways. You could become the Secretary, or Communications link or Health & Safety

representative on the Board – that would take more time – but this is not required. Maybe there's something else you need to give up in order to enable you to take on a new role, supporting God's work outside of the church.



Lectio 365



I was introduced to this devotional over Christmas and thought I would give it a go. I downloaded it from my app store for free!

It's different from just reading a bible passage, it gives you the option each day to listen to someone reading and guiding you through the meditation, or you can read it for yourself. What I love about it is that it reminds me daily to 'Pause and Pray and be Still' - before rushing in to read. This pause can be as short or as long as you like, then you are invited to move on. It gives you a few verses of praise, then another pause to pray, then another reading and a brief explanation or challenge from the passage.

It gives you already written prayers to pray (that helps on days when you have no words!), then you are invited to read the same passage again and it asks you a reflective question.

I have already been challenged this year by a question - 'What have you stopped asking God for? Plus a challenging thought 'God is willing to give more than we are willing to ask' and another - 'answered prayers are not rewards but gifts of Love from God'.

The devotional is written by an assortment of writers with different themes and different styles each week.

If you were not aware Stranton and Burbank Church have a WhatsApp group where a lot of us are reading through Lectio365. Some of us comment on what we have been blessed with or challenged by. We would love it if more people joined. It really helps to be a part of a group like this as we can pray and encourage each other.

Mary Baines' Recipes

Fisherman's Pie

1 lb firm white fish – skinned 2 ½ oz butter 34 pint milk plus 6 tablespoons 1 ½ oz plain flour

1 bay leaf pinch of nutmeg

Twist of black pepper 3 hardboiled eggs - chopped

3 oz frozen peas 3 oz frozen sweetcorn

1 tablespoon chopped parsley 2 lb potatoes – peeled & diced

Salt & pepper to taste

Place fish in saucepan with $\frac{3}{4}$ pint milk, bay leaf nutmeg, pepper & pinch of salt. Simmer for 10 minutes.

Boil potatoes, drain & mash with 6 tablespoons milk till smooth - season to taste.

Transfer fish to a plate, flake & remove any bones. Strain the cooking liquid into a jug. Discard bay leaf.

Make up a white sauce using butter, flour & cooking milk

Stir in chopped eggs, parsley, peas & sweetcorn. Seasoning to taste.

Fold in the flaked fish. Spoon into a buttered pie dish.

Spread potatoes over the fish & smooth the top.

Heat oven to Gas 6, 180C fan, 200C.

Bake for 30 minutes till brown. For a crunchy topping - 10 minutes before the end of cooking - roughly crumble a bag of plain crisps over potato or 2 oz grated cheese with 1oz crumbled cornflakes.

Serve with buttered carrots.

Lemon Cotswold

6 oz digestive biscuits (crushed) 3 oz butter

1 lemon jelly 6 oz Philadelphia soft cheese

6 fl oz water 2 large lemons - juiced

8 oz caster sugar 1 small tin evaporated milk

(well chilled)

Make base by melting butter & stir into crushed biscuits.

Dissolve jelly & leave to cool.

Cream together cheese & sugar till light, beat in cool jelly & lemon juice.

Whip evaporated milk, then fold into cheese mixture.

Pour over biscuit base & chill well for some hours or overnight



Lent

Lent is the period of 40 days which comes before **Easter** in the Christian calendar. Beginning on Ash Wednesday, Lent is a season of reflection and preparation before the celebrations of Easter. By observing the 40 days of Lent, Christians replicate Jesus Christ's sacrifice and withdrawal into the desert for 40 days. Lent is marked by fasting, both from food and festivities.

Whereas Easter celebrates the resurrection of Jesus after his death on the cross, Lent recalls the events leading up to and including Jesus' crucifixion by Rome. This is believed to have taken place in Roman occupied Jerusalem.

The Christian churches that observe Lent in the 21st century (and not all do significantly) use it as a time for prayer and penance. Only a small number of people today fast for the whole of Lent, although some maintain the practice on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. It is more common these days for believers to surrender a particular vice such as favourite foods or smoking. Whatever the sacrifice it is a reflection of Jesus' deprivation in the wilderness and a test of self-discipline.

Why 40 days?

40 is a significant number in Jewish-Christian scripture:

Most Christians regard Jesus' time in the wilderness as the key event for the duration of Lent.

Why is it called Lent?

Lent is an old English word meaning 'lengthen'. Lent is observed in spring, when the days begin to get longer.

The last week of Lent is called Holy Week.

Shrove Tuesday

Shrove Tuesday is the day before Lent starts: the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday. It's a day of penitence, to clean the soul, and a day of celebration as the last chance to feast before Lent begins.

Shrove Tuesday is sometimes called Pancake Day after the fried batter recipe traditionally eaten on this day.

Shrove Tuesday celebrations

Shrove Tuesday is a day of celebration as well as penitence, because it's the last day before Lent.

Lent is a time of abstinence, of giving things up. So Shrove Tuesday is the last chance to indulge yourself, and to use up the foods that aren't allowed in Lent.

Giving up foods: but not wasting them

During Lent there are many foods that some Christians - historically and today - would not eat: foods such as meat and fish, fats, eggs, and milky foods.

So that no food was wasted, families would have a feast on the shriving Tuesday, and eat up all the foods that wouldn't last the forty days of Lent without going off.

Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday is the beginning of Lent for Western Christian churches. It's a day of penitence to clean the soul before the Lent fast.

Roman Catholic, Anglican, and some other churches hold special services at which worshippers are marked with ashes as a symbol of death and sorrow for sin.
