We do not have the words—even the scriptures do not have the words—which perfectly describe the Holy Spirit.

Pope Francis writes of our comforter: "The Holy Spirit is a great worker, not a 'trade unionist'. He is a great worker, and He works in us, always. He does this work of explaining the mystery of Jesus, and of giving us this sense of Christ. Forgiveness is not a result of our efforts, but is a gift."

The scriptures usually use the word 'voice'. That does not exactly fit. These very delicate, fine spiritual communications are not seen with our eyes nor heard with our ears; it is a voice that we often feel more than hear.

We can't communicate spiritual knowledge with words alone. We can, with words, show one another how to prepare to work in and through the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit itself will help with this process. We just need time to stop, be still and listen because it's often in the stillness and silence that we perceive the moves of the Spirit.

The voice of the Spirit is described in scripture as still and small, almost a whisper sometimes. Yet it can pierce our very soul and cause our heart to burn.

The Spirit does not get our attention by shouting. It never shakes us with a heavy hand. The Spirit whispers. It taps so gently that if we are preoccupied, we often miss or discount it completely.

Occasionally, the Spirit will press just firmly enough or often enough for us to pay attention; but from my experience, most of the time, if we do not heed the gentle feeling, if we do not listen with those feelings, the Spirit will withdraw and wait until we come seeking, listening and attentive.

I have learned that the very impressive and miraculous spiritual experiences come very infrequently. We can so often wrongly label things as moves of the Holy Spirit. We must be vigilant and always remember that there is a counterfeit.

We cannot force spiritual things. A testimony is not thrust upon us; it grows. And a testimony is a testimony, and it should be respected, whether it is small or large. We become taller in our testimony like we grow in physical stature and hardly know it is happening. We become more confident in our faith and in sharing God's story in our life with others.

I know that the gospel is true; the Holy Spirit is in it. If you rely on that, if you push into that then you are doing the work of Christ our beautiful Lord and Saviour, our Redeemer. Then in those works of love, of kindness of service to others you will find a deeper relationship with the Father. I know this to be true because of how it softened my heart and curbed my judgement (of myself and others), when I began to truly know Papa and to love and live from that place.

It is in knowing that the Holy Spirit lives, knowing/feeling His voice when He speaks, in knowing Him, and living a life that bears witness to that knowing, that's where our souls find rest and true freedom presides.

The Holy Spirit is a voice that we feel as much as we hear. My prayer for us all is that we'll hear Him clearly and heed Him quickly.

From the Home Front

I have felt that the last few weeks have been a time of searching and looking, alongside a time of waiting, but then having to accept the end results.

We went to Dundee for a break in Holy Week. A city we have passed through but never stopped to explore. When we looked online at the attractions we wished to visit we found several were closed on the days of our visit, so we had to rethink our itinerary. While in the city I had hoped to buy two things – Keiller's marmalade and Dundee cake, both of which I remembered from my childhood. Despite looking in shops, tourist centres and delicatessens we could not find either! Keiller's factory in the city had long since been demolished and the delicious 'orange jam' is produced in Arbroath, but outlets are difficult to find. As for the Dundee cake, which was originally also made by the Keiller family since the 1700s, that proved just as elusive. Having been sent to a local bakery we discovered that 'due to shortages' they were not making Dundee cakes at the moment. A sad disappointment, but we did manage to find another local cake – Kirriemuir Gingerbread, which although totally different, was delicious.

As spring crept into our garden this year we watched for signs of growth on the apple, pear and plum trees we bought and planted last year. As it was a lockdown they were purchased online, what a disappointment! They arrived as three large twigs with roots in a box. The roots had no soil or protection and there was no 'how to care for' or planting instructions... We looked up how to plant fruit trees and all year we cared for them. Not a leaf or sign of growth was observed. So we looked hard again as spring touched the garden - but nothing. So like the fig tree in the bible, we took them out – the roots had not grown at all since they were planted, they were dead! So we went to a local nursery and purchased replacement fruit trees and they are already settling in, covered in leaves and with hopefully fruit to come next year if not this.

Conversely the rhubarb I planted several years ago has always been pretty stunted in its growth, so last year I bought it a 'friend' plant and gave them both plenty of compost. At the first signs of growth this year I covered them with a bucket weighted down with a stone. Two weeks later I went into the garden to find the rhubarb stalks had pushed off the bucket and stone and the first crop was ready for picking! More in that first picking than I had had in the last three years!!

I have learnt a great deal about patience and determination during the stories I have related. I have learnt that no amount of care can resurrect some living things, that the encouragement of friends can be vital to wellbeing. Also that an alternative can give as much, if different pleasure, if you are prepared to be flexible. Lessons for life maybe?

Vicar's Report for APCM Stranton Church 2021 Written on Easter Day 2022

¹⁰ This is what the Lord says: 'When seventy years are completed for Babylon, I will come to you and fulfil my good promise to bring you back to this place. ¹¹ For I know the plans I have for you,' declares the Lord, 'plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future.' From Jeremiah 29

In the time I have thought and prayed about this year's APCM, the above verses have kept coming back as a theme for the Church Community at Stranton. 2021 was the year of continued pandemic and significant transition. Thankfully we have not experienced 70 years exile but we have all been through a tough time. None the less God is with us and I do believe his promise is for His work to continue to prosper in our midst. So then may we press forward in faith.

Many of you reading this will be aware that Julie and I have experienced some very difficult circumstances recently. As I write I am still positive for Covid. I am therefore simply going to put a few bullet points together trusting that this will suffice as my report:

- Teamwork and ministry: Firstly my thanks goes to all who minister here, lay and ordained. The team here is amazing. Increasingly we have seen that we can step away and Church continues to happen. Thank you in particular to Peter Anderson who is stepping down as Church warden after 6 years, I am sure we all recognise Peter works incredibly hard with little or no fuss. Thank you.
- During the year both Clive Hall and Michelle Delves finished their training for ministry and are now recommended to seek a post of significant responsibility. Rachel Price continued as our contextual ordinand while Lizelke Klindt finished early as an MEV to concentrate on her PhD and return to South Africa. In November we were joined on placement by Anita Burke a final year ordinand from Lindisfarne RTP. Mary Tones (reader), Rev Andrew Craig and Rev Kevin Tones also continue to offer authorised ministry within the parish. In the summer Mother Gemma left St Aidan's so the above clergy are now working as a team across three parishes. In July I announced my plans to retire in the summer of 2022 allowing the commencement of a recruitment process which hopefully will culminate in a clergy appointment in June 2022. Thankyou to all those who committed to working with Sheila Bamber in the prioritisation process.
- Pandemic: Early in the year some of the services were streamed from church, but in person services continued throughout the year despite the Delta Wave in November and December. In the summer we restarted singing in person, alleluia! Communion continues to be offered in two kinds

through intinction. We have continued to stream both 9am and 11am, more recently in a simpler way. We returned to offering refreshments in the autumn using the new facilities at the back of Church. We celebrated Christmas in person including hosting the Group Carol service and a Christingle where we were joined by Stranton School. Morning prayer continues daily through the week on zoom.


- The decisions regarding Burbank Community Church were implemented during 2021. Clive Hall led a service of thanksgiving for Burbank Community Church later in the year.
- Bereavement: Sadly a number of long standing key members of the congregation died during the year and others have experienced significant long term health problems. The pastoral care group continues to support the housebound and lonely. Funerals continued through the year with a gradual move back to services in Church. Both weddings and baptisms returned with a bang as the restrictions lifted with really significant numbers of services in the summer. As part of the process towards baptism we restarted 'welcome services' as part of Lighthouse monthly.
- Sunday Club, Messy Church, Toddlers and Cake and Coffee all restarted in the autumn with surprisingly good numbers. Folk really wanted to get out and meet each other. Thanks again to all who make these things happen.
- The St Matthew's Community Centre Committee worked hard to provide a safe place for community use. As the year went on we were able to open up with really good footfall including several new groups. There was a health and safety incident on 15th September 2021 reported elsewhere.
- Schools work has continued either on line or in person depending on the prevailing conditions. Ward Jackson remains a priority for our Church (worship, school visits, governors and chaplaincy) but the clergy team and Communities of Hope team have worked with our regular school contacts: Stranton, Eldon Grove and Kingsley as well across the town St Aidan's, Throston and Eskdale.
- Michelle has maintained our links with Elwick Grange nursing home where monthly communions have now restarted.
- Norman continued as Civic chaplain for another year. We hosted two civic services in the autumn and Norman led the Remembrance Day service at the cenotaph in Victory Square.
- Throughout 2021 we continued to work with asylum seekers. Numbers are lower than previously experienced but alongside a continuing Iranian group we established a small group consisting of Iraqis and Eritreans, this latter group again supported by Jo from Communities of Hope. Thankfully after some very

long delays these folk are beginning to get their home office interviews allowing things to progress with several of the Iranians being given leave to remain. In the summer we stopped offering in service translation into Farsi because of a lack of translators. More generally as a Church with the Afghan crisis PCC decided to sign up as a Welcome Church. We also support through a grant 2 weekly English classes for asylum seekers at the People's Centre.

- Communities of Hope established a number of ongoing projects including Syd's Kitchen, The Sewing Bee and a weekly drop in. However we have seen significant staffing changes with Jess leaving to train for ordination and Emma reducing her hours and stepping down as Project Lead. We appointed Aneta Bradley as the new Project Leader late in the year and pray for more stability, the recruiting of a new team and continued effective outreach in 2022.
- PCC reviewed the support we offer to Missionary Societies. During the year we agreed to adopt two new missionaries supported by CMS and also to offer support to the Kilimatinde Trust, maintaining our link with Tanzania rather than Festo and Grace who are now based in England.
- The screens project was completed. There were on going repairs following a leak in the central heating system in the Fulthorpe Chapel near the kitchen. A significant faculty was submitted for work to the Bells which we anticipate will happen in 2022.

There is probably much more to say but hopefully this gives a flavour of the year just passed. Amidst all the struggles, both individual and corporate, God is good. May we together discover a place of wellbeing and community growing in love, peace hope and joy. May we know God given abundant life that ripples out into our town and may God indeed prosper his work.

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Peace be with you

After Jesus had died on the cross and was buried in a closed tomb for three days, we read that he appeared to his disciples. Luke Ch 24 :36

Jesus stood among them and said "Peace be with you" I had always thought that He said those words because they were terrified and thought that He was a ghost.

Matthew Henry's commentary says "Peace be with you" are words of comfort. Jesus visits them out of love and friendship"

I want to suggest that Jesus is reminding his disciples that 'He' is their peace. He is telling them that He died and rose again so that we all could have peace. Peace that we can be right with God. Peace in the knowledge that our sins are forgiven. Peace knowing that when He is with us we do not have to fear. Jesus is our peace. The world that we are living in is not at peace and we can let fear in. When fear comes in where does it settle? In our minds.

Later on in the same chapter of Luke, Jesus asks the disciples "Why are you troubled? And why do doubts rise up in your mind?" Jesus knows our minds are our biggest battle field and He speaks peace into the disciples and our minds.

In verse 49 He goes on to say that: "I am going to send you what my Father has promised you", He sends the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is God's presence within us.

We no longer have to grieve Jesus' absence, as the Holy Spirit is in every believer.

Jesus is seated next to His father interceding for us. His Holy Spirit is our comforter, our counsellor and convictor. When we know that the same spirit that raised Jesus from the dead is living in us, we do not have to fear. We can have His peace and in turn spread His peace to others.

Where are you letting fear into right now?

Are you allowing your own fears to spill into the lives of those around you? Have you taken your eyes off Jesus, the author of Peace? I invite you to pray with me now:

Jesus thank you that you died on the cross to conquer sin, death and fear. I repent of the times where I allow fear to settle in my mind and to infect my life and the lives around me.

This Easter I ask you cleanse me of my sin and to refill me with your Holy Spirit and fill me with your peace.

The tiny wrens are very fond of the ivy that trails along the ground. They are a bit difficult to spot, unlike the wood pigeons who stand out in both plumage and size. The wood pigeons have beaten the wrens to first place in the RSPB Bird Spotters League this year.

Watching the birds I see that God doesn't have favourites but is within a prayers reach and available to all.

Mary Baines' Recipes Revisited

Danish Cod

¼ lb streaky bacon
¼ lb button mushrooms
¼ lb cooked frozen peas
4 cod pieces
1 oz butter
Seasoning

Chop bacon and arrange with the whole mushrooms and peas over the bottom of a buttered oven proof dish. Place cod on top and sprinkle with seasoning.

Dot with butter

Cover with lid or foil – bake for 20 minutes at gas 4 or 190C, remove lid and bake for another 20 minutes.

Serve with new potatoes – serves 4.

Carrot Cake

4 oz soft brown sugar 4 oz marg 8 oz grated carrot 8 oz flour

- 2 oz raisons
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 2 oz chopped walnuts plus few for surface

In saucepan mix the sugar, marg, raisons, carrot, spices & two tablespoons of water and bring to the boil for three minutes stirring continuously. Cool until it is just warm.

Mix in the salt, flour, cinnamon, nuts and stir until the consistency of a thick batter. Add a little water if it seems a little dry.

Place in 8" greased cake tin and cook at Gas 4, 190C, 180C fan for about one hour leaving the tin to cool for about ten minutes before turning out onto cooling tray.
