Why are we here? (The musings of a priest)

Over the last few weeks, I have been challenged by the question "Why are we here?"

Why are you here? Why am I here? Why are we here?

It is probably something you'll hear me talking about quite a bit over the coming months because it's something I think is really important.

It's a question that has many strands over many different areas.

We need to ask ourselves as individuals 'Why am I here?' Why am I in this church, in this community, serving in this particular way? What is it that draws me here? It might be that we feel deeply called to a particular church and a particular ministry, which is great. It might be that we feel called to serve but don't know how and this was an obvious way to get involved. Maybe there was a gap and no one else to fill it. Maybe it's something we've just been doing for years (maybe decades!) and haven't really thought much about it. These are questions to ask of yourselves as you explore whether there is a better way for you to serve.

Then there is the bigger question: "Why are WE here?"

What is the purpose of our church in this community? What are we here to do? How are we supposed to serve? I use 'church' in the loosest sense – you could think of this as our individual parishes, our group, our Community of Hope, or any one of the individual activities or services that we regularly hold. You might also think of the wider multi-denominational Churches Together when asking why we are here – many strands, many areas.

Church is the Body of Christ – "where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I with them". Church can mean all Christians right across the town, or it could simply be two or three of us coming together to pray.

As the Body of Christ we are called to serve our community and to serve the kingdom. There are so many different ways in which we can serve our community as we seek to bring each and every person on a journey closer to Christ, but what, specifically, are we meant to be doing? Why are we here?

Why are you here? Why am I here? Why are we here?

This is what gives us a sense of purpose, a sense of direction, and a sense of belonging and commitment. This is something I'm going to be thinking on and praying into over the coming months, as I seek to understand God's vision for the church. What does He have in store for us? Why are we here? How can we serve our community/communities in the best way possible? How can we engage with our neighbours, in a loving and meaningful way?

I encourage you all to explore these questions for yourselves as well. God speaks through all of us and he might show us the way through something He says to you. If He does, then I want to hear from you. We're all in this together, seeking the answer.

So I ask you to think, reflect and pray on one simple question: Why are we here? Grace and Peace,

From the Home Front

Listening to Lectio 365 earlier this month I was really struck by Pete Greig's thoughts about this passage of Isaiah:

"....these I will bring to my holy mountain, and make them joyful in my house of prayer; their burnt offerings and their sacrifices will be accepted on my altar; for my house shall be called a house of prayer for all peoples."

The Lord God, who gathers the outcasts of Israel, declares,
"I will gather yet others to him besides those already gathered."

Isaiah 56:7-8 (ESVUK)

One of the most surprising things in this passage is that the community envisaged by Isaiah is to be marked out by joy (v.7). Not heaviness, but happiness. Not solemnity, but smiles. 'Houses of prayer are meant to erupt frequently with laughter, celebration, singing, and exclamations of delight. Why? Because, as Seraphim of Sarov said, "The Holy Spirit turns to joy whatever he touches"... In other words, any person or community truly filled with the Spirit will overflow with the very joy that effervesces at the heart of the Trinity.'***



I listened twice and read these pieces three times. What kept striking me was the emphasis on happiness, smiles, laughter, celebration, singing, delight, effervescent joy- NOT heaviness or solemnity. Where the Holy Spirit is allowed in, everything touched by Him is turned to joy, and that joy is the very heart of God, Jesus and the Spirit. Too often in my life I have attended churches, which are shrouded in solemnity, devoid of joy. The Holy Spirit is not allowed in or welcome – no happiness or laughter is found there. Needless to say these are churches with dwindling congregations and no children, as who wants to join a religion that is neither welcoming or with no hope of happiness. I am filled with happiness in church when I sing praises and worship and hear words sent by God through members of the congregation, where the children are accepted for their energy and enthusiasm, high fives and artistic creativity. It is a place where my Father, Saviour and the Advocate dwell, it is where love is and joy can bubble up – a heavenly home on earth.

It's obvious isn't it? (The musings of a priest for September)

This morning I was speaking on one of Jesus' parables – the parable of the vineyard owner in Matthew 20. This is one of the parables I have always found easier to understand because let's face it, many of the parables aren't as obvious and straightforward to understand as we might hope.

Indeed, the disciples often thought the same as well – we know this because they were forever asking Jesus to explain them.

Jesus' response – 'It's obvious isn't it?'.

Well actually it's not. A conversation over coffee ensued where one church member said they'd never quite fully understood that parable. The one where all the different workers turning up at different times get paid the same at the end of the day. To me this says that it's never too late for anyone to seek God's generosity. It means that there will be those in heaven who have never given God any consideration until their final moments, yet at the last, they have found God and been welcomed into the Kingdom.

The lesson for me (and for all of us) – don't assume that everything is obvious to everyone. It isn't. Do I speak in metaphors and riddles, or am I clear in what I say? Something for me to think about and ponder on. What about you? Do we speak clearly or do we use jargon, metaphors, and insider knowledge in how we speak, in what we say?

In the engineering world before I was ordained, we were forever using TLAs (Three Letter Abbreviations) for all sorts of things – often they had different meanings for different people. Sometimes (rarely, but it did happen) no-one actually knew what the letters stood for.

Jesus' parables are sometimes the same. They mean different things to different people, and sometimes, just like the disciples, we don't really understand what Jesus was getting at. We need to read his explanation, and endure his frustration, as he says to his disciples, and to us, 'Isn't it obvious?'

And so it is when we talk to others about our faith. We use words that only as mature Christians, with that insider knowledge, do we understand what they mean.

So think about not just what we say, but how we say it. Is it understandable and accessible to others, or do they go away confused by what we say? Do we hit the mark or miss the target completely (to use a metaphor)?

God is holding your hand

"So do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand."

Isaiah 41:10 N

When we say "yes" to Jesus and follow Him we become his children. As a parent you want to keep your children safe. So one way to do that is to hold their hands. Little ones don't always like that as they want to be independent and will try and wriggle out of your hand, when they do that as a parent you squeeze a little tighter!

God has been talking to me lately a lot about His right hand, so when I read a verse saying He holds me with His righteous right hand, I see Him so big and my hands are so small. I see Him leading and guiding me, gently squeezing my hand for reassurance and a gentle tug if He sees me going down the wrong path.

"Even there your hand will guide me, your right hand will hold me fast." Psalms 139:10 NIV

Of late I have been asking God to show me His purposes and His plan for my life and I have had this written on my blackboard in my kitchen to constantly remind me that He will lead and guide me.

'You will show me the path of life; In Your presence is fullness of joy; At Your right hand are pleasures forevermore.' Psalm 16:11

The verse says that in God's presence is the only real place we will experience full joy, the joy that doesn't run out or grow old or boring. Jesus has all the pleasures and treasures in His right hand. So why would I go anywhere else looking for pleasures or joy?

Holding hands with someone is quite intimate, you wouldn't walk around town and grab someone's hand and walk with them! You would normally hold hands with people that you already have a relationship with.

Jesus longs for us to be intimate with Him, to let Him come close, to let Him love us and be close to us. Even when we are feeling at our worst He wants us to cuddle up to Him and stay with Him till He speaks into our situation and allow Him to reset our feelings.

Have you ever just sat and asked Jesus to show himself to you? If Jesus is holding our hand it means He is right next to us.

So I invite you to use your God given imagination and imagine that Jesus is next to you. Now turn to Jesus and look at Him.

What emotion is His face showing? What does it feel like to be so close to Him? What is He wearing? Sit for a while in His company, notice how it feels to be close to Him.

I would encourage you to make that something you do often, be alone in His presence holding His hand. Talking and listening to Him and his instructions for your life.

God promises us that He will never leave us or forsake us. God never lets go of your hand.

Kilimatinde and The Bear Ladies

Thank you all for a warm welcome to Stranton Church.

I am not new to Stranton Church, having worshipped there while my children were growing up. It was lovely to be back and invited to say a little about my upcoming journey to Kilimatinde in October.

Background

In 1995 Bishop Alpha Mohamed from the diocese of the Rift Valley in Tanzania visited Hartlepool and was welcomed by Stranton church congregation and clergy. The vicar back then was Stephen Taylor. That first connection inspired and enabled various activities and projects, and a deep connection with people and place. Some of the projects were a link with Manor School and St John's Secondary School, Tanzania, a visit from apprentices at Hartlepool FE College to Tanzania to help build a new classroom. A huge fundraising effort from the whole town of Hartlepool to enable a dam to be built. Many visits and much support from Hartlepool hospital for the hospital there and other exchange visits of students, doctors, nurses, local government councillors and officers, ministers, choirs etc. In 1997 a charity was formed to enable these projects and visits to happen. The latest Hartlepool initiative has been to establish the Bear Ladies who have used their skills to create a pattern to sew together pieces of African fabric to create colourful teddy bears for sale. The sales so far have raised £3000 and this was given to Rt Rev John Lupaa when he visited in 2022 and will be used to support the victims of burns in the newly opened Burns Unit at the Kilimatinde Hospital.

The Bear ladies aim to raise £3000 per year to enable all the patients in the little eight bedded unit to receive the first 10 days of treatment free. This means that there is a greater survival rate for these life-threatening injuries.

Update

Kilimatinde village and the diocese, has seen much development over the years, due to the generosity curiosity and dedication of the people who have visited, the friendships made and the prayerful caring from those who have never even seen the place, or the people. I was struck by the line in the hymn, 'I the lord of sea and sky', sung by the music group while I was with you in Stranton. The hymn references holding people in your heart, and that's just what you've done in continuing to remember the Diocese of the Rift Valley, one of the poorest regions.

The school, St John's, is seeing excellent results, and young people are gaining qualifications to enter into work and or go on to higher education. The Theological College is thriving and training people in serving God - teaching, preaching and serving each other in community. The churches are growing.

The dam has transformed the local environment and is known in the area as Taylor's Dam, it is exceptionally beautiful and a haven for wildlife and birds. Water is still needed though, wells still need to be sunk and pipes laid etc. All the hospital wards now have running water along with the hospital accommodation.

There will always be things to do and work to be done, but God is in the midst of it, and we trust and rest with this.



What is the Foodbank?

Hartlepool Foodbank is owned by Hartlepool's churches:- it has been very effective at extending God's love in Christ to some of the most vulnerable people in our town with support from Christians and Church communities in Hartlepool. As a founding member of Hartlepool's Food Council, we have strong links with

Hartlepool Borough Council and other organisations working for the relief of poverty, many of which refer people to the foodbank for help according to need.

What is it seeking to do?

We aim to reduce the need for foodbanks and hope to do away with them altogether, by helping people to take control of their home situations and finances, through working with initiatives such as West View Advice & Resources providing people with holistic support, and by employing an influencer/organizer to raise awareness of the causes and remedies of food poverty. We are also greatly looking forward to Oxford Road Baptist Church establishing a community shop (early next year), adding this to the other partner organizations that share our aims and work with us to address food poverty.

What are its immediate needs?

The last 12 months have however been very challenging, with immediate problems still needing to be addressed. Changes in welfare support after *Covid* lockdowns and the "cost of living crisis" have increased considerably the demand for emergency food relief, and have also increased the cost of providing the food itself. We have already spent more than three times the amount of money we had budgeted to buy food this year. In the short term this shows no signs of abating. We have responded by increasing our opening hours and reorganizing our warehouse operation.

Volunteers!

These and our new strategic direction have generated new opportunities for volunteers - as well as helpers making food parcels and listening to clients, we need at least another van driver and another trustee to help direct the organization.

Churches' continuing support

We would love to strengthen our links with our churches. Although increased donations, of both food and funding, are very welcome (please do!), would you also like an employee or trustee to come and speak to a meeting or group that you belong to or support?

Above all, pray for our work and our clients - and engage with us...

After enjoying our burgers, we set off for the highlight of the day - conquering the thrilling Ninja Warrior course in Leeds!


We're currently playing board games (can anyone beat Mr B at draughts?!) drinking hot chocolate and enjoying some of Jack's homemade Golden Syrup cake


Hello everyone! We're back with updates from the last two action-packed days of our annual summer camp!
