A new start

I am sure many of you know what it is like when you start a new job, find this, where's that, learn all of the new names, how many passwords, make connections, understand the processes etc and with this comes a bucket load of anxiety and stress.

I started my new role as the Mission Enabler for the Central Hartlepool Group Mission Project (this was formerly 'Communities of Hope') in the middle of January and strangely, I am not feeling any anxiety or stress, I'm actually feeling totally energised. Why?

When I took this job, the main remit was to start up new worshipping communities and to do this in the unfolding new media backdrop of the resignation of the Archbishop of Canterbury, calls for more resignations, several historically mishandled safeguarding cases, a backdrop of church closures and falling church attendance and arguments between different groups within the churches. So how can I be buzzing with excitement about mission?

Firstly, I think of Malachi 3:2 "... for He is like refiner's fire and like fuller's? soap". I really feel like God is in the process of taking all Church denominations through the refiner's fire to get us all back to building His Kingdom on Earth as He wants it. Each day I try to start by saying the Our Father and I especially focus on the "Your Kingdom come, Your will be done" and just simply ask God to take over and work through me, or to put that another way, ask that I don't get me in the way of who He wants to speak to, and amazing things seem to happen. It's like the Holy Spirit is shouting "Over here, this way!".

Christ's ministry was very much for the religious outsiders of his time. Many churches are doing great things helping those in society who are in trouble and are often on the outside, but the leap for them directly into church is a massive one, tainted by society's image of Church and God. However, what I have found, against what we might expect, this is a time of massive opportunity for Christ's love to reach those who are becoming aware that their lives are missing something which our modern society isn't giving them. They are looking for wellbeing. They are sensing there is something else. It's the call of the soul to find the Creator.

My job is to put in the stepping stones from this confused awareness that there is something else, into a relationship with their Creator and the benefits of being a loved and valued part of His family, which we call church.

Please pray that God's kingdom comes and His will is done His way.

From the Home Front

It has been an unusual few days where I have seen God at work.

We have an elderly family 'Aunt' who at 103 had still been living in Cumbria in her own home, only recently as her mobility deteriorated, requiring carers. After Christmas we suddenly realised we had not spoken to her and on calling her landline repeatedly we found there was no reply! My sister had asked her for a contact number of someone local in case a problem arose as she was a widow, had no children or close relatives who lived nearby, and thinking about her age... We were left working with three possibilities of what may have happened – she could be ill in hospital, in a care home, or deceased! So we prepared to drive over to Cumbria to look for her.

I prayed about how we should approach tracing her whereabouts. Before setting off I felt that the initial route I should take was to telephone the local Registrar's office to see if her death had been registered recently. The lady who answered my call was definitely sent by God. She knew of our 'Aunt' and called me back within ten minutes. Using her local people knowledge she had discovered our 'Aunt' had recently become a resident in a Care Home in the nearby town, she even supplied me with their contact number! Further enquiries discovered our 'Aunt' was at that point in the nearest hospital receiving treatment and that we would need to speak to her official 'next of kin'. The Care Home kindly passed on my details to this person - who it turned out was the daughter of the late John and Mary Baines of Stranton Church, she now resides in the North West too! Within the hour the hospital had told me our 'Aunt' was to be discharged that day back to the Care Home and the 'next of kin' had phoned me. She and I established our common ground of her parents, Stranton Church and how our 'Aunt' was our Mum's school friend and who were friends until our Mum's death, she was also Godparent to our sibling, and had been known as 'Auntie' all our lives and with whom we had ongoing contact. I certainly felt that God's hand was on us every step of the way.

So my sister and I visited our 'Aunt' in Cumbria where we unfortunately found that since her return to the Care Home she had deteriorated and was on end of life care and no longer conscious. However the care she was receiving and the stream of visitors to sit at her bedside was astounding. Such love and respect was heartwarming. We spent two days there, which gave us opportunities to talk to her, show our love for her and to say our goodbyes in this earthly life. But also for me to have the opportunity to pray over her, give thanks for her long life and to commit her back into God's eternal care, when He is ready to receive her.

It is wonderful how God provides for us throughout our lives from conception to death. He puts people our way to implement His love, even when we are no longer aware and able to make conscious choices. How amazing is our Heavenly Father – our faith and trust is repaid more than we could ever expect... How blessed are we?

An update on Durham Crown Nominations Commission process

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ

As a diocesan family we have received difficult news today (Monday 17 February) concerning the appointment of the next Bishop of Durham. The National Church has released the following statement:

The Crown Nominations Commission (CNC) for Durham met and nominated a candidate for the See of Durham, with interviews taking place in November 2024. However, the candidate has decided to withdraw from the nomination.

Having decided in November not to nominate a reserve candidate, the CNC has agreed to reconvene later in the year to continue the process of discernment.

A further update on the timescale for the Durham CNC will be offered in due course.

The Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell, said: "I want to thank The Bishop of Jarrow, Sarah Clark, for her ongoing service as acting Bishop of Durham, and everyone in the Diocese who is undertaking additional responsibilities during the vacancy. I will be praying for them, and please pray for the CNC as they reconvene to seek God's discernment for the next Bishop of Durham, and for everyone served by the Church in the Diocese."

Clearly this is both unexpected and disappointing news. As the statement makes clear, this is the nominated candidate's decision. Even though the candidate's identity will remain unknown please do pray for that person and all those affected by this decision. The CNC process for the appointment of the next Bishop of Durham has now recommenced and a timetable for the appointment process will be given in due course. These are unusual circumstances so please pray for the whole CNC and especially for the six members from our Diocese representing us – Val Barron, Jamie Harrison, Mark Miller, Rick Simpson, Frances Stenlake, Mags Vaughan. They have already invested themselves in giving their time and energy to this process and now they have this fresh responsibility that has come so unexpectedly. Please do not ask them to comment as they are under strict obligation to keep confidentiality. We must trust them, the process and the Holy Spirit in this matter.

Throughout the Vacancy in See process and especially during the period of interviews last November we have prayed together. It therefore is right that we turn intentionally to the Lord Jesus in prayer at this difficult moment in our journey.

The scripture that has particularly come to me, +Sarah, at this time has been Matthew 14: 22-32, when the disciples are afraid, Jesus shouts to them though the strong winds across the water, 'Take heart; it is I; do not be afraid'. Taking heart is a call to courage and hope; to take courage because Jesus is with us even in the most unlikely situations when we cannot see clearly. In such stormy conditions we look to Christ who calls us on in faith and trust. Please be assured that the Bishop's Leadership Team and all who serve the parishes and diocese will continue stewarding our diocese through this unexpected situation with the steadfast hope and purpose that we have worked with throughout these past twelve months. God is faithful and the future will become clearer in time.


Easter Eggheads 2025

Pantyfedwen - A hymn tune

I am always on the lookout for new hymn tunes. To that end I am fortunate to have been given recently some fifteen or so hymn books from different collections. One of these was Christian Hymns published by the Evangelical Movement of Wales in 1977. In this wide ranging collection of just over 900 tunes there are quite a number of tunes by Welsh composers.

I am also a lover of the sound of a Welsh Male Voice Choir, singing in their own language, although I cannot speak it I find it attractive to listen to, and if I happen to have the Welsh lyrics to hand, to try and follow these. Poetry in music.

For no other reason one day, other than just browsing through this collection I came across a tune called Pantyfedwen, and playing it over on the keyboard it did have something familiar about it. But then I find that happens quite often and once again I was mistaken. But I followed up this tune to see what I could find.

Pantyfedwen was written by Morris Eddie Evans, born at Talysarn, Gwynedd in 1890, he was a hymn writer and composer, as well as church organist and conductor of a number of local choirs. He never studied music formally, but had a natural musical talent. He died in Oldham, Lancashire, in 1984.

The words of the hymn were written by William Rhys Nicholas. He was born in Pembrokeshire in 1914 and was a highly cultured Congregational Minister who made a hugely significant contribution to Welsh literature and hymn writing.

The combination of Pantyfedwen and Nicholas' words were put to the test at Eisteddfodau in Pantyfedwen in 1967 (winning words) and 1968 (winning tune). The Eisteddfod was established in Pantyfedwen, a small village in Cardiganshire, by David James. He was a successful businessman of Pantyfedwen and owned a cinema chain in the London area.

He was a devout believer and gave large sums to the Non Conformist denominations in the area. His passion for the language and the culture of his native Wales resulted in him establishing many Eisteddfodau and also the Pantyfedwen Charity Foundation.

Here are the words of the first verse , translated from the Welsh by Peredur Glyn.

This was your miracle, O Lord above, You filled my soul with everlasting love For you, the bells of all Creation ring, And when I hear, what can I do but sing?

As countless voices joyfully proclaim, Eternal praises to your glorious name, The Halleluiah fills my soul anew, And I give, Jesus, all my praise to you.

If you would like to listen to this hymn there are at least two versions which I found on Youtube. One is by the Australian Welsh Male Voice Choir in an arrangement by Tom Buchanan. The other is an arrangement for mixed voices and orchestra by Jeffrey Howard.

To be a pilgrim

It was 1978, we'd only moved to Hove about 6 months earlier and the Chaplain to Cardinal Newman School, a Father Bill Haynes came to our house to ask me if I wanted to go on a 2 week, 180 mile pilgrimage to Glastonbury, walking about 18 miles a day, starting with a Mass and visiting all of the old churches on route and, as if to really sell this, he said we would be sleeping on hall floors!?! I politely said I'd think about it, but my head was screaming no way.

I spoke to a friend at school the next day about this priestly encounter and to my utter amazement he said enthusiastically, that he'd had a great laugh on the previous year's pilgrimage to Walsingham, there were loads of girls from schools up in Surrey and they all went to the pub at lunchtime and had a laugh in the pubs in the evenings. It was his sales pitch that worked and not necessarily for the right reasons, I signed up.

Still to this day I can clearly remember standing by myself on the pavement corner outside the Arundel Cathedral Hall watching what seemed like a mayhem of people all saying 'hello' to others they had met on the previous year's pilgrimage and me thinking "Patrick, you complete idiot, you've just signed yourself up for two weeks with a bunch of religious nutters. You've got yourself into this, you'll just have to through with it", followed by, "Well God, if you're there, this is your chance to make sense."

Oh yeah, God hears those kinds of prayers! Sleeping together, laughing together, walking together, sharing together, singing together, eating together, getting soaked in the rain together, climbing the hills together, comparing blisters together, drinking together, enjoying the countryside together made the being in church together more meaningful and the Masses more alive. As I now look back, I see that we were in fact walking the road to Emmaus with Christ in each other, being Christ to each other.

Then, in the second week of this pilgrimage, at Brockenhurst in the New Forest, the new bishop of the Diocese of Arundel and Brighton met us in our overnight hall. He was on holiday visiting his brother who was the parish priest there. It was me who said to him that we were all going to the pub and did he want to come with us? To my surprise he said yes, got to the bar first and bought the biggest round of drinks I'd ever witnessed, drinks for all of us!! I sometimes tear up when I think of this moment because in some ways, never was a soul so cheaply bought as that round of drinks. Every negative stereotype I'd had about church melted away.

This new bishop was Cormac Murphy O'Connor who later went on to be Cardinal Cormac Murphy O'Connor, but more importantly, a friend. By the end of the pilgrimage, I'd started my own life's spiritual pilgrimage to journey towards the God of perfect love.

I now had the courage to say yes to other church youth events, yes to joining the Young Christian Workers, yes to helping in youth work, yes to setting up a music groups in churches, yes to becoming a catechist, yes to becoming a special minister, yes to eventually becoming the leader of those pilgrimages when they were getting run down in the 1990's, and have consequently walked the length and breadth of England and Wales, I met Becky on one of these pilgrimages (but she wasn't from Surrey) and we have both walked the 500 mile Route Francais Camino de Santiago in Spain together.

So to summarise, I now walk like a pilgrim, am married to a pilgrim, think like a pilgrim, drink like a pilgrim, sing like a pilgrim, pray like a pilgrim

and thank God, I am his pilgrim.

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
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The Divine Exchange

What Is Shrove Tuesday and What is the Meaning of Eating Pancakes?





Shrove Tuesday—also known as Fat Tuesday or Pancake Day—is the day before Ash Wednesday and the official countdown to Lent. It's the last day before the season of fasting and reflection begins, so traditionally, Christians have used it as a time to confess sins, seek absolution, and prepare their hearts for Lent. Some churches also burn the previous year's Palm Sunday branches to create the ashes for Ash Wednesday.

But let's be real—what most people associate with Shrove Tuesday is food, and for good reason! Historically, this was the last chance to use up rich ingredients like eggs, butter, and sugar before fasting, which is why pancakes became the star of the day. Even today, many cultures celebrate with indulgent meals before stepping into the Lenten season.

Because Easter moves each year, so does Shrove Tuesday—it always falls 47 days before Easter Sunday. In 2025, it will be on March 4th, but depending on the year, it can land anywhere between February 3rd and March 9th. Whether you observe it with pancakes, confession, or both, Shrove Tuesday is a meaningful (and delicious) way to prepare for Lent!

The roots of Fat Tuesday or Pancake Tuesday, also known as Mardi Gras, trace back to ancient pagan celebrations focused on fertility and the arrival of spring. As Christianity gained influence in Rome, there was a concerted effort to Christianise existing pagan traditions, including the incorporation of Fat Tuesday into Christian practices. This transition aimed to channel the exuberance of the pagan festivals towards preparing for the solemn period of Lent, which begins with Ash Wednesday and entails fasting and spiritual reflection. The name "Shrove Tuesday" arises from it, marking the culmination of the season known as Shrovetide, which includes indulging in food that one might give up as their Lenten sacrifice. The word "shrove" is derived from the Old English word "shrive," which means to confess one's sins and receive absolution. Shrove Tuesday is traditionally a day of preparation for the fasting and penance of Lent. In the Middle Ages, Christians would go to confession, or "shrive," on this day to prepare themselves for the upcoming season of Lent.

The association with pancakes is thought to have originated as a way for people to use up rich foods like eggs, milk, and sugar before the fasting period of Lent began. These ingredients were often restricted during Lent, so people would make pancakes to consume these items before the period of abstinence.

History of Shrove Tuesday

The tradition of acknowledging the start of the Lenten fast has been observed for hundreds of years. By the late Middle Ages, the feast of Shrovetide lasted until the start of Lent. It was customary in many cultures to eat pancakes or other foods made with the butter, eggs, and fat that would be given up during the Lenten season. The tradition of British Christians enjoying pancakes on Shrove Tuesday dates back to the 16th century.
